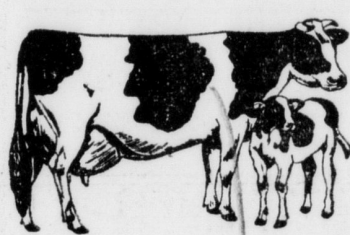

This "sit tight" attitude prevails in spite of the fact that the drilling agreement signed by 48 property owners in the Donegal area, calls for them to present written notices of their damage claims to the Real Estate Division of the Army.

Harry Zeager, whose land suffered more damage than the others, had this to say: "I feel confident that someone from the Air Force will contact us before too long."

Howard Longenecker, another farmer, said: "I think we could wait until time for Spring plowing if necessary. After that we would be covering up the damage. If the Air Force doesn't make a move by then we may take action as a group."

In all, the Air Force concentrated its drilling tests on 11 farms, all around the line where the main runway would be located if the base were located in that area.

Those farms include: Harry Zeager, J. Z. Herr, Edward Garber, Howard Longenecker, Amos Longenecker, P. B. Longenecker, Jr., Harry Hauenstein, Levi Gish, C. K. Herr, Elmer Kraybill, and one farm on the Cameron estate, operated by Lewis Bixler.

The Air Force agreement with the farmer reads: "In connection with National Defense work of the Department of the Army, the Government plans to make certain investigations in the area including your property, and permission from you to enter upon your land for this purpose will be of great benefit. This investigation will consist chiefly of surveys and test borings."

"If you will be kind enough to cooperate with the government to the extent of granting your permission, please sign the enclosed copy of this letter in the space provided for your signature."

"It is understood and agreed that if your property is damaged in any way such property will be restored or compensation made in lieu thereof, provided you present written notice of your claim to this office."

J. Z. Herr pointed out that he had not fully inspected his fields, because he wanted to wait until he was sure the Air Force was thru testing in that area.

"The thing that did the most damage was the 10-wheel tanker which was used to haul water for the drilling," said Howard Longenecker. Several farmers pointed out that the tanker got stuck, and had to be pulled out of some of the wet fields.

During the first week of drilling operations, rain and warm weather combined to make the fields soft, and easily rutted. Freezing weather later on cut down on the damage, according to the farmers.

On the Ziegler farm, 6 fields were heavily tested, during early drilling. At least 75 holes dot the farm with 30 of them in a new grass field.

Lewis Bixler said he thought the drillers: drove across fields where they could as easily have driven around by roads. But he said the drillers told him they weren't familiar with the roads.

The P. B. Longenecker farm, on the edge of the concentrated drilling area, suffered little, if any damage, according to Longenecker.

The general attitude of the farmers is one of "wait and see." If the Air Force doesn't make a move by Spring, then the farmers say they will.
