JUNIOR HIGH DEFEATED LANCASTER TWP. IN PLAYOFF

The Mount Joy Junior High basketball team moved into the final round of the County Junior High League playoffs with a hard-fought 32-30 decision over Lancaster Twp.

The championship contest between Mt. Joy and Ephrata, winners over Paradise is tentatively set for Tuesday, February 26. It too is planned for the Litzitz court.

Friday night's victory over Section Two titleholder Lancaster Twp. was pretty much a one-player scoring affair for the locals. Jay Metzler, who garnered 17 of his team's total 32 points was the spark that enabled the victors to roll up a 29-24 advantage in the first three periods.

Metzler hit the loop with six shots from the field and converted five of six foul attempts.

Mount Joy was hard pressed in the final period and had to stave off a determined bid for victory by the township crew.

Metzler's layup put Mt. Joy in front by seven points as the final period got underway and it appeared that they would win easily.

But Warfel's two goals and a foul by Metzler brought Lancaster Twp. to 32-28 with two minutes to play. Jim Howry and Warfel were successful from the foul line but Lancaster Twp. couldn't find the range with the necessary twin-pointer to tie the score.

Warfel, another sharpshooter who stands 6 ft. 2 in. was high scorer for the losers with 14 points. Gerald Miller with 8 and Ashenfelter with 7 recorded Mount Joy's other points.

The winners converted eight of twelve foul attempts, while Lancaster Twp. hit eight out of 17.
