ler, Lancaster, as solicitor; the firm of Coleman, Greiner and Coleman, Landisville, as the architects; and the First National Bank, Landisville, as depository.

The group also decided that regular meetings will be held the third Monday of each month, at Landisville. The annual reorganization meeting will take place the third Monday of January, 1953.

Since the authority plans to float a bond issue to finance the new school, a motion was passed to em-

ploy a Philadelphia firm as bond counsel.

One of the main items of business was the signing of agreements with Mr. and Mrs. J. Wayne Augst, Elizabethtown, for the purchase of 27.7 acres of land as the site for the school. Total cost of the land is \$41,550.

Present for this part of the session were members of the Hempfield Joint School Board since arrangements for the purchase of the site were made by a committee of school directors composed of Christian Greider, Mt. Joy R1; Harry Ressler, Mountville; and Norman Bowers, Landisville.

The site for the new building adjoins land on which the present school buildings of the East Hempfield Township School District are located. The ground fronts on Stanley Ave., Landisville, on the north and on the south adjoins a road leading from Landisville to Oyster Point.

The new building will accommodate 600 pupils from the school districts of East Hempfield Township, West Hempfield Township and the borough of Mountville.

Authority members felt that even though a survey of the land has been completed and the agreement of sale signed, it may be one to two years before the project can be completed.

Nation, there is no better time to harvest our crops than standard time.

We are soon coming to the time when we can go to the barn in the morning at 5 o'clock without using any lights. Then if we should turn our clocks ahead one hour, then we would have to use our lights one hour again in the morning. But that is not all. We cannot harvest our crops in the morning when it is wet. We must wait for the sun to dry and cure our crops. Therefore, if we want better crops standard time always was and still is the best time to farm by.

But friends will you stop here and reason a little. If we turn our clocks ahead one hour again, a lot of farmers must get up at 5 o'clock and some earlier to have their milk ready. Here is what happens: Up at 5 o'clock on fast time and if it is wet in the morning it is late in the forenoon until we can start getting in crops and a lot of time crops are put in before they are quite fit, therefore making a poor grade of feed. And a lot of times we must work from 5 o'clock in the morning until 8 or 9 o'clock in the evening. Did you ever stop to think what would happen if the farmers would only work 8 hours a day?

Friends let us all stick together and have last time wiped out. There is no need of turning the clocks ahead. Do you know that our Capital Building, Court House, Railroads, and Air Lines all keep standard time?

The heaviest loads ever pulled was only when the horses all pulled together.

So will you all consider if we shall produce more food, we must raise better crops and with the shortage of help on the farm, will you all consider and work together and keep standard time. When God made the long summer days he made them long enough for everyone. Will you all who prefer to keep standard time do your little part and drop a card addressed to the Borough Council of your home town or city, requesting that we keep standard time.
