We understand down in Chester Co. sportsmen liberate about fifty foxes annually so they can enjoy fox chases. To us, that doesn't make sense.

In an effort to have shad above any of the three dams in the Susquehanna river, the State Fish Commission contemplates trucking them over the hump. Just what will be the outcome of this effort remains to be seen.

The authorities will net then tag each shad, after which it will be placed in one of the three lakes above Conowingo.

To us this effort doesn't make much sense and we fear it will simply prove "more money over the dam" and still no shad.

Grass Silage And High Quality Hay

The making of grass silage and high quality hay has aroused the interest of thousands of livestock men throughout our country in recent years. As production costs increase and incomes stabilize, it appears that the more liberal use of high quality roughages becomes a more important factor in efficient production.

The proper way to make good grass silage, wilt or not to wilt, the preservative, if any, that should be used are just a few of the many questions that are controversial at this time. In the hay-making line many growers are asking about stem-crushers, mow-finishers, and chemical cures, as well as other ways of making the best hay.

In order that everyone may have a chance to learn more about the above topics a meeting was held today, Thursday afternoon at 1:30 p. m. on the farm of Elias Z. Musser, Mount Joy Route 1, near the Musser Poultry Farm.

Mr. R. H. Olmstead, Dairy Extension Specialist, from the College discussed the feeding of grass silage and quality of hay at this meeting. Mr. Joseph McCurdy, Extension Engineer from the College, discussed the proper use of the machinery including the mow hay-finisher.

RAILROAD FREIGHT RATES WILL BE BOOSTED AGAIN

The Inter-state Commerce Com- mission Tuesday gave the railroads a further freight rate increase, esti- mated to hike charges by about 673 million dollars a year.

The rise is nine percent in the South and West and six percent in the East.

The order boosts rate 15 percent above what they were at this time last year.

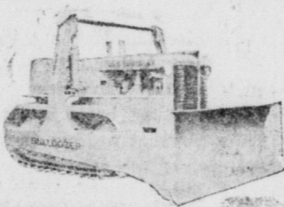

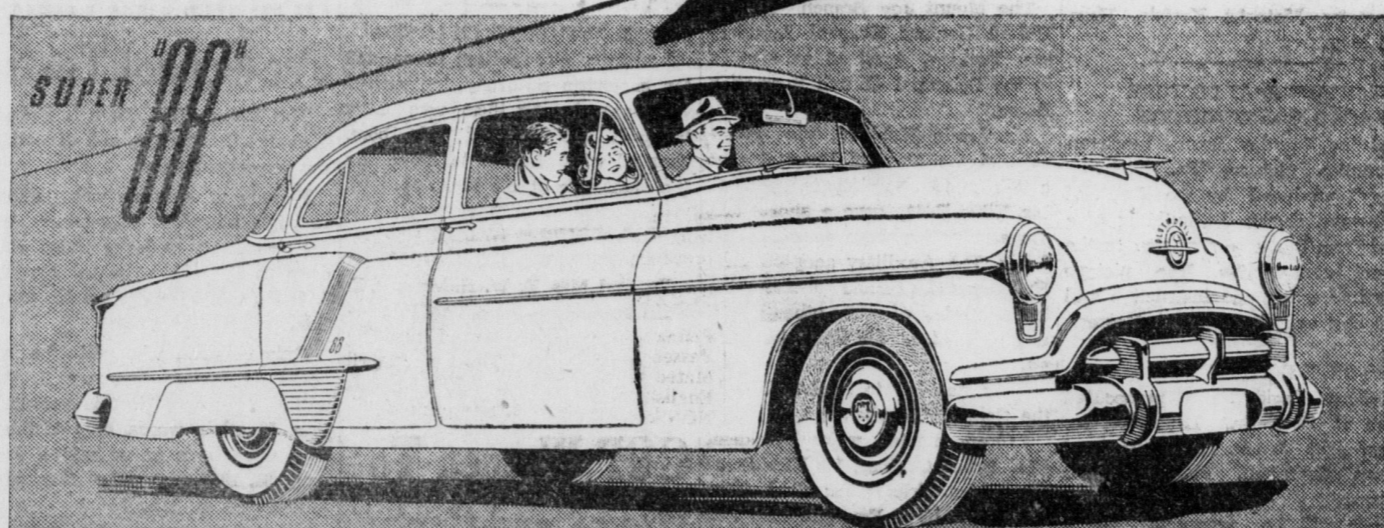
