

That evening was spent at Radio City where the class saw the movie "Singing in the Rain" followed by a program featuring the large Radio City organ, the Radio City orchestra, a fashion show, the Rockeers precision dancers, and several other singing and dancing numbers with outstanding staging and lighting effects.

## Farmer's Question Corner

### WHAT ABOUT HOG CHOLERA?

**Q:** How dangerous is hog cholera?

**A:** Cholera is our worst swine killer; causes losses running into many millions of dollars annually.

**Q:** Why is cholera so dangerous?

**A:** The virus of cholera is extremely contagious and one of the most deadly of all in the field of swine diseases.

**Q:** How is the virus spread?

**A:** In many ways. It may be spread by contaminated feed bags, garbage, wagon and truck wheels, or on the shoes of visitors. Even biting flies may spread it.

**Q:** What are the symptoms of cholera?

**A:** Usually it strikes without warning. Pigs lose their appetites, keep to themselves, become weak and depressed, get wobbly on their feet, and may scur. There is no cure. Sick pigs usually die within 4 to 7 days. Very few, if any, recover.

**Q:** What can the farmer do to prevent cholera losses?

**A:** Vaccination in advance is the only preventive. Pigs should be vaccinated around weaning time. Only healthy pigs should be vaccinated, so a general physical check-up by a veterinarian is always recommended before vaccination.


**Q:** Are there any other precautions?

**A:** Yes. Vaccinated pigs should be kept in clean quarters and ranges away from old yards. Pigs should be watched so that they do not pile up or overwork at night. Ample drinking water and shade should be provided in hot weather.

### WHAT ABOUT CALF SCOURS?

**Q:** Is there more than one type of calf scours?

**A:** Yes, there is an infectious type, and a non-infectious type.

**Q:** What causes infectious scours?

**A:** Infectious scours, often called white scours, is caused by germs that are common to many farm lots and buildings.

**Q:** How fast does calf scours develop?

**A:** A calf which seems to be well in the morning may be dead before night. First, the calf is listless and has no appetite. The next symptom is scouring. After that, the animal may collapse within a few hours.

**Q:** Is this primarily a problem of young calves?

**A:** Yes, chiefly animals less than one month old. The older calves may scour, too, but the chances of survival are somewhat better.

**Q:** What can an owner do if an outbreak of scours starts?

**A:** A veterinarian should be called promptly. The calf should be isolated, and the stables disinfected to safeguard other calves.

**Q:** What about treatment?

**A:** It is a waste of money to give drugs unless the basic cause is first determined. The veterinarian may recommend serums, sulfa drugs, or penicillin depending on the diagnosis.

**Q:** What preventive measures can be taken?

**A:** Feed cow balanced rations to help her produce a strong, healthy calf. See that the calf is born in clean, well-ventilated quarters on clean bedding and obtains colostrum milk. On infected farms have serum administered soon after birth. Be sure that young calves are fed properly, but not overfed.

University Law School. He was admitted to the Lancaster County Bar in 1905 and lived in Lancaster until 1933.
