I graduate 3 July 1952 and I hope to get home for a couple of days. I sure miss the Eastern hospitality. I declare Westerners are the most unfriendly people. I thought at first they just didn't like the Waves but even when we're in cities it's so hard to carry a conversation with so many of them. A lady I met was guessing where I'm from and said I must be from Pennsylvania because I'm so friendly. I never knew Pennsylvania is supposed to be a friendly state.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Beef-Vegetable Sandwich
1/2 lb. ground lean beef
2 teaspoons hot fat
1 Tablespoon flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 can condensed vegetable-beef soup
