Air Force Spent \$10,000 To Check On Donegal Site

The Air Force spent \$10,000 to determine that the Donegal site in Lancaster County was not suitable for a proposed air maintenance depot, the House Armed Service Committee was told in Washington.

Rep. James Van Zandt (R-Pa.), a member of the committee, told a reporter he had requested the information. The cost involved the drilling of 375 holes at a cost of \$7,500. Van Zandt said, "Travel and other expenses of survey teams totaled \$2,500."

The Air Force found, as a result of drilling, that underground conditions were not suitable and subsequently decided on Hammon, N. J. for the base.

EAST HEMPFIELD BOOSTS PER CAPITA TAX TO \$10 The East Hempfield Twp. School Board recently adopted a resolution to increase the per capita tax to \$10.

The present per capita levy is \$5, the board noted, and the increase is expected to provide an estimated annual revenue of \$16,500.

At the same time the board adopted another resolution providing a tax of \$2 per month on each trailer used for dwelling purposes in the township. This tax has been in effect in the township since 1947.

POSTAL DEPT. DEFERS ALL EMPLOYEES PAYDAY

Over 400 postal employees in Lancaster city and county face a pay-less payday unless Congress gets busy on a deficiency bill and provides the funds. The Postoffice Department at Washington explained it has run out of money to pay about 400,000 postal workers throughout the country.

A deficiency bill to provide the needed funds is before the Congress, but a series of amendments has snarled its adoption and sent the measure to a Senate-House conference committee.

The Postoffice Department has notified postmasters to withhold salary payments to themselves and all employes for work done after May 15, until the necessary funds become available.

Elect 3 Teachers; 25 Mill Tax By E. Donegal Board

Three teachers were elected to the faculty of the East Donegal Township group at a special school board meeting May 29. Mrs. Mary Martin, a graduate of Millersville State Teachers College who formerly taught in Conewago Township, Dauphin County, will teach second grade in Maytown; Mrs. Kathryn Alwine, a graduate of Elizabethtown College who formerly taught in Jackson Township, Lebanon County, will teach the fourth grade in Maytown; and Matthew Meyer, a graduate of Elizabethtown College, who formerly taught in Mount Joy Township, will teach the sixth grade in Maytown.

The school budget was adopted with 18 mills for the general purpose plus an additional 7 mill for the new joint school or in the event that the school is not built, to go toward additions to the present Township schools. Eli H. Randler's Body Was Found In Chickies Creek

The body of Eli H. Randler, 73, Columbia R1, was found floating in shallow water of the Big Chickies Creek, a half mile south of Erb's Mill near Newtown, at 2:30 p. m. Sunday.

The body was badly decomposed and Dr. I. L. Moyer, Columbia deputy coroner, estimated it had been in the creek for about a week. State policeman Edward Hermsky said Randler was last seen alive May 26 by Clarence Seigrist, on whose farm he had lived for the past month. The man had been in ill health for some time with a cardiac condition and had been hospitalized at the General Hospital.

Three brothers, John H. Manuel, 916 Houston St., Columbia; Eugene Manuel, Manheim, and Parke Manuel, 131 S. Front St., Columbia, made the discovery while looking over a property they are considering buying.

Dr. Moyer, who issued the death certificate of drowning said there were no marks of violence on the body.

Randler, a farm employe and handyman, had also lived in Strasburg and Manheim in recent years. Identification was made by William W. Zeamer and Charles G. Zeamer, both of Columbia R1.

The appeal has been lodged with the borough zoning board of adjustment, which is expected to set a hearing. Estock said one reason he appealed was because the board has been reorganized since it originally ruled against him. The ruling held that the home was out too far in the street.
