"TAKE HOME PAY"

How do you explain a complicated financial statement to employees? It's a tough job to break it down into terms everybody understands.

A retail food chain recently came up with a unique idea. A small booklet compares company expenses with the deductions listed each week on the pay check of employees. Each page discusses a company "deduction." Money spent for merchandise, wages, taxes, maintenance, and contributions is explained in terms of the deductions each employee finds on his own pay check. Net profits of 9/10 of a cent in the sales dollar are referred to as company "take home pay." Familiar phrases like these make it easier to understand the company's financial structure and problems.

The booklet was timely, too. 1951 was the first year of the firm's new employee profit-sharing plan, and employees were particularly interested in the financial condition of their company.

Ideas like these help bring management and labor closer together in their understanding of the complex business picture.
