SENATOR ED. MARTIN SAYS "BLUNDERING INCOMPETENCE" CAUSED POTATO SHORTAGE

The potato shortage was caused by the "blundering incompetence" of the Office of Price Stabilization, says Sen. Edward Martin (R-Pa.).

In a transcribed broadcast over Keystone state radio stations Martin, former governor of Pennsylvania, said the OPS had been warned that its "stupid price ceiling" policy would result in production of less potatoes.

Martin said his mail "reflects anger, indignation, bitterness and pain" over this situation.
