Farm Calender

NOAT OAK WILT—During July and August and on into September is the time when you can best recognize oak wilt. When frost hits in early fall and leaves turn in color, it is more difficult to identify the disease. The outbreak of anthracnose this year is confusing, says Edwin Honey, Penn State extension plant pathologist.

CHECK ON HEIFERS—It is poor management to turn the dairy heifers out on summer pasture and then forget about them, reminds Joe Taylor, extension dairy specialist of the Pennsylvania State College. These heifers will be the future milking herd. They should have enough feed and care to keep them in thrifty condition.


CULL OUT ROOSTERS—When the breeding season is over, cull the roosters out of the flock, says Carl Dossin, extension poultry specialist of the Pennsylvania State College. Roosters are valuable only for producing fertile eggs for hatching; thereafter they are worthless and eat feed which should be used by the rest of the flock.

WATER ROSE BED—The rose bed should be given a thorough soaking once every week or 10 days, recommends A. O. Rasmussen, Penn State extension ornamental horticulturist. Watering in this manner will provide the moisture needed by the roses.

BUY RAM NOW—Do not wait until breeding time to get the ram for sheep flock, Thomas King, Penn State extension livestock specialist, reminds that breeders of good purebred stud rams usually have their best rams sold early in the season.

CLEAN GRAIN BINS—Protection against grain insects should start with cleaning old grain out of the bins and spraying with an insecticide, says John Pepper, Penn State extension entomologist.

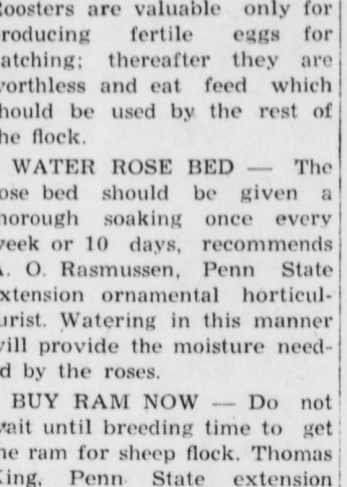

Farm Safety Vital As Labor Supply Shrinks

Harrisburg, July — Because the number of workers on farms is decreasing as more labor-saving machines are developing, there is greater need than ever for observance of safety measures in all types of farm work if production of food is to be maintained, according to Miles Horst, State Secretary of agriculture and Pennsylvania chairman for National Farm Safety Week, July 20-26.

About 25 years ago, one out of every four workers in Pennsylvania was on a farm, he declared. Today the average is one person out of seven. A nationally shrinking farm worker population must provide more foods for a total population that reportedly is growing at the rate of more than 2,000,000 a year, he added.

For more than ten years the demand for more food has been met by American farmers, Secretary Horst said. Although the amount of improved or cropland in Pennsylvania has dropped nearly 5,000,000 acres in the past 50 years and more than 1,000,000 acres in the last ten years, farmers of the State are

June Milk Price Is Set At \$3.93

Dr. C. J. Blanford, Market Administrator of the New York metropolitan milk marketing area, announced today a uniform price of \$3.93 per hundredweight (45.5 quarts) for June milk deliveries to 419 plants in the New York milkshed. The uniform price in May was also \$3.93 per hundredweight, while in June, 1951, it was \$3.88.

The producer butterfat differential for June was announced at 6.6 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 standard.

Dr. Blanford said that the consumption of fluid milk in June was up 3.78 percent over the same month in 1951. Production increased only .77 percent but set a record for the month.

Total milk production for June amounted to 768,715,640 lbs. as compared with 762,640,000 lbs. a year ago. The supply came from 49,479 dairy farmers, a decrease of 556 from June 1951. Production per day per dairy in June averaged 518 lbs. to set an all-time record for any month since the federal and state milk marketing orders became operative in September, 1938.

Total farm value of June's production is \$30,571,629.05, made up of \$30,210,524.65 at the uniform price, and \$361,095.40 in butterfat and location premiums.

Payment at the uniform price of \$393 per hundredweight will be made for milk testing 3.5 percent butterfat received at plants 201-210 miles from New York City.

Give The Other Fellow A Break When Driving

How are your motoring manners?

There's a two-sided answer to that important safety question, according to Edward P. Curran, Safety Director of Keystone Automobile Club.

"Politeness in respect to other highway users is natural and accustomed behavior on the part of the great majority of motorists," he declared. "Such well-thinking drivers always give the other fellow a break, are careful to use hand signals indicating every turn, stay on their own side of the highway, allow others to pass with plenty of room to spare, etc. Politeness, in these instances, add up to greater enjoyment and safety for all."

"Politeness toward passengers in one's car, however, can be overdone to the point of danger. Drivers should never take their eyes from the road when talking to traveling companions. . . the driver who looks away for just a second actually is driving blind over 58 feet of road at 40 miles an hour, 66 feet at 45 m.p.h. and 73 feet at 50. Drivers should be extremely careful when lighting a cigarette, cigar or pipe and never should attempt to hold a lighted match for a passenger.

And to be very much on the safe side, escorts should pull up to the curb and alight from the curb-side after the traveling companion has stepped out onto the pavement; the traditionally courteous move of the driver alighting on his (the traffic) and walking around the car to help a passenger alight on the other side has its obvious dangers.

Politeness most assuredly has its place on the highway, but safety rates top consideration, too.

Red Feather Campaign Goal Announced

A campaign goal of \$502,263 for the 28th annual Red Feather Campaign has been approved by the Board of Directors of the Community Chest. The campaign goal was approved by the Board following the presentation of the report from the Budget Committee by William H. Beadle, Committee Chairman.

Chairman Beadle's Committee met with representatives of each of the 19 local Red Feather Services to discuss the agency programs and financial needs for 1953. "We couldn't escape the fact that health and welfare agency costs are rising the same as are those in other businesses. At the same time, demands for services are growing," Mr. Beadle stated.

This year's goal is approximately 12% more than the \$450,000 raised in last year's campaign. One new local agency will be participating in the United Campaign this year for the first time. The Lancaster Jewish Center will become the seventh youth service in the Chest along with the Y.W.C.A., Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Recreation Association, Crispus Attucks Recreation Center and the Boys' Club.

The Chest Budget Committee recommended that provisions be made in this year's goal for an additional visiting nurse to better serve County areas, an additional therapist for the Crippled Children Society because of the increasing number of patients, an additional field executive for the Boy Scout Council because of the increase in the number of troops and walking around the car to help a passenger alight on the other side has its obvious dangers.
