

There were 87,200 checks totaling approximately \$2,066,000 disbursed to eligible unemployed workers during the week ended June 20.

There are today in the United States women in congress, both in the senate and in the house; a woman is in charge of manpower; at Sunday, July 20, 1952 least one woman is a U.S. circuit judge, the next highest in rank below the Supreme Court. There was a woman governor of Wyoming as far back as 1924.
