Collin E. Fink, 77, of 546 N. Third street, Columbia, a former resident of Donegal Springs, was killed instantly when he fell down a flight of steps at his home. John D. Denny, acting coroner, said Fink died of a broken neck.

He was born in Donegal Springs, a son of the late William B. and Mary Smith Fink, and was a retired foreman of the shipping department of the Keeley Stove Co., having retired about 12 years ago. GOAL INCLUDES USO

Included in the goal is \$18,000 for the United Defense Fund, Public Charities Association and Pennsylvania Mental Health, Inc. These are included, in turn, through the Pennsylvania Health & Welfare Fund, the state-wide federation formed recently to campaign for funds in Pennsylvania for national and state organizations. "The bulk of the funds for this purpose will go for USO services all over the world", commented President Stehman. "USO will receive more than 80% of the funds in the UDF which is a national federation of six agencies. We have learned that Lancaster County as of July 1st has 4,626 men and women in uniform so we feel that Lancaster County should support the U. S. O."

The campaign, under the General Chairmanship of C. Abram Snyder, will begin October 13 throughout the County.

JOBLESS PAYMENTS

Harrisburg, July—New claims for unemployment compensation decreased 18 percent to a total of 38,700 for the week ended June 20 from the previous week's 47,300, the State Bureau of Employment Security reported today. There were 87,200 checks totaling approximately \$2,066,000 disbursed to eligible unemployed workers during the week ended June 20.

40 LICENSES REVOKED

Harrisburg, July—In the week ending June 27 the Bureau of Highway Safety withdrew the cards of 1152 drivers. Of this number 40 were revoked and 1112 suspended. Operating privileges were restored to 875.

She Led Men

Lesson for July 13, 1952

WOMEN complain that this is a man's world. Well, it's half a man's world anyhow, because about half the grown people in it are men. But that's not the point. Women complain because men are the bosses, men get the big salaries, men run the government. Women are teachers but men run the school board, and so forth. As a matter of fact, it can be doubted whether women actually would like it the other way. Women like men who are leaders, men with minds of their own, who can take hold of troublesome situations and straighten them out.

Wife, Mother, Judge
AN YHOW, Deborah was a woman like that. Her name means "Bee" and she was the sort of woman who would somehow sting lazy or timid people into doing their duty. She is the only one of the "Judges" of Israel who was a woman.

Now some female heroines are a bit odd, to say the least of it. Take Joan of Arc, who was a kind of bee herself, and who took over when the rightful leader hung back. Joan was the kind of girl who could hear voices no one else heard. She was not exactly the kind of girl any man would feel quite comfortable with.

And naturally she never married. But this Deborah was a wife and a mother. She made some man happy, she was a home-maker, children cuddled up in her lap.

When later she became a "judge" she had all the wisdom of common-sense and of normal experience as the basis of her other wisdom. She knew how mothers and home-makers feel. When it says that she "judged Israel" it does not mean that she ran for office like modern judges, or that any king had appointed her, for there was no king to do it. It means simply that everybody respected her judgment so much that when there were problems tangled and twisted that common, they would go ask Deborah what she thought.

She Didn't Like a Sissy
ON one famous occasion Deborah did not wait for the man to come; she sent for him. He lived far from her home, and his name was Barak. She put an idea into his head, only it was not her idea, she claimed for it the authority of God.

Barak was to be a general, he was to recruit an army. She told him, there under the palm tree, where he was to get his army, where he was to take it and what to do with it when he got there.

Space does not permit the details that would show that Deborah's ideas were absolutely sound from a military point of view. She was a whole General Staff by herself.

But Barak backed off from his great opportunity. He would go, he said, provided she would go along. Now Deborah didn't like that. She liked a man who would go out on his own without having to have a lady at hand to tell him what to do. So she went; but she told him the journey would not be for his honor.

That, however, is another story. The point is that this Deborah was a woman so wise that the ablest man in the country at the time was not willing to do anything important without her advice.

Deborah's Daughters
DEBORAH was not the last woman whose wisdom and whose decisions have led men to success.

There are today in the United States women in congress, both in the senate and in the house; a woman is in charge of manpower; at least one woman is U.S. circuit judge, the next highest in rank below the Supreme Court. There was a woman governor of Wyoming as far back as 1924.

But for every woman who makes the headlines and Who's Who, for every woman who has some official position, there are hundreds of others, un-nominate and unsung, who are known in their homes and in their home towns for their unflinching good advice.

"Ask Mrs. _____" is the first thing the neighbors think when something comes up. And sometimes a wise woman's reputation doesn't even get around to the neighbors. Sometimes it is only her family that know how wise she is.

But it is a safe guess that if you took out of our modern life all that women contribute, all the good acts and far-sighted policies that they have thought of first, ours would be a much worse world than it is.

Rent Control

From now until September 30, 1952, the amended Rent Stabilization Law will effect landlords and tenants in this Rental Area in exactly the same manner as before the expiration of the 1951 Law on July 1, 1952. E. D. Condon, Director of the Lancaster-York-Reading Defense Rental Area announced today.

However, the new law effective July 1, 1952 provides that each incorporated governing body, such as a city or borough council, must pass a simple resolution declaring that a housing shortage continues to exist, if Rent Control is to be extended until April 30, 1953 in such city or borough.

The Director further pointed out that if the incorporated communities comprising a major portion of the Defense Rental Area, which consists of Lancaster, York, and Berks Counties, vote to extend the Rent Control Law, then all unincorporated municipalities would also be covered by the Rent Stabilization Program until April 30, 1953. The Director explained that incorporated municipalities are cities and boroughs, and unincorporated municipalities are townships. The Director stated that it is necessary for each incorporated municipality to take affirmative action by September 30, 1952; otherwise, Rent Control will end in that particular community on Sept. 30, 1952.

In the meantime, the Rent Director stated, the Rent Stabilization Law contains the same provisions of a whole range of adjustments for landlords to enable them to be compensated for improvements, increased services, increased occupancy, increased costs, and inequitable rents and strong eviction protection for tenants, and supervision of the program and action on appeals by a local Rent Advisory Board consisting of unpaid volunteers representing the public interest, landlords, and tenants.
