Mature Peaches Are Good Buy

"Mature but not overripe fruit is a good buy in peaches," says Helen Denning, Penn State extension nutritionist. "The background instead of the blush of the peach is the guide to maturity."

When buying peaches, look for a creamy or yellowish background color to be sure peaches are mature enough to ripen, she advises. Too much green in the background indicates peaches are not mature, lack flavor, and are likely to shrivel before ripening. As for the blush, it is attractive but some well-flavored varieties never have it, even when fully ripe.

Peaches are highly perishable, Miss Denning points out. Choose those that are ripe, mellow to the touch, and sound when you're buying peaches to use within a day or so. It's ideal also to buy ripe peaches for canning or freezing if you can use them promptly. Otherwise, those at the firm-ripe stage are a safer choice.

DONEGAL FARM AIR SERVICE

Donegal Farm Air Service are now operating on a full scale with approximately 500 acres of tomatoes contracted for dusting service. This organization also has been using a liquid spray applied by airplane for the control of insects, such as Japanese beetles on corn and tobacco worms and aphids on tobacco. This liquid chemical spray is becoming more widely used each year, as new insecticides are being developed which are especially well suited for use in aircraft spray equipment.

In fact Sam Miller, president of the Authority, is determined that not a single foot of Main Street will have to be dug up. Instead mains will be taken down through rear yards or in alleys.

By crossing through rear yards, the mains will be located in close proximity of most cesspools. Cost of connections by each individual property owner also will be greatly reduced through this plan.

In communities where sewer lines are laid along the front streets, property owners have to completely reverse the system of pipes already installed inside their homes, it was explained.

"It will be a big project but Mount Joy has soil ideally suited for excavations of this kind and we should be able to obtain a modern system at a much cheaper price than other towns of the county such as Manheim and Lititz," Mr. Miller explained.
