County Breeder Wins High Award

Brattleboro, Vt.—Southeastern Pennsylvania Artificial Breeding Coop., of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, is the owner of Hillmac Sovereign, registered Holstein-Friesian bull recently named a Silver Medal Production Sire by The Holstein-Friesian Association of America. Based on the superior milk production of the bull's daughters as compared to their dams, the Silver Medal honor marks him as an outstanding sire of the Holstein breed of dairy cattle.

To attain this high honor, at least 10 daughters of production-tested dams must have themselves been tested with records averaging at least 3.4% test and 410 pounds of butterfat on a two-milking, 305-day basis. Furthermore, the average records of the daughters must exceed their production expectancy by 40 pounds of fat. Expectancy for the daughters is defined by the association as the point midway between the production of the dams and the average of all tested Holstein cows.

His 15 qualifying daughters, producing an average of 607 lbs. of butterfat on a twice-daily milking, 305-day basis, exceeding the production of their dams by 10 lbs. of butterfat and averaged 3.89% test. This award is based only on official Herd Improvement Registry or Advanced Registry records supervised by The Holstein Friesian Association of America in cooperation with the various state agricultural colleges.

Marietta TC Depot Has Civilian Welfare Council

There is at Marietta TC Depot a Civilian Welfare Fund that is established for the benefit of all Department of the Army Civilians employed at the Depot.

The purpose of this is to provide support for essential recreational and welfare activities for all civilian employees at the installation. The recreational and welfare activities that are supported are many and varied and may include operation of a recreation center, support of intrastation athletics and sports, employee newspapers, group activities such as camera club and little theatre groups, and general recreational facilities for the entire depot. It is possible for an employee to get an emergency loan under certain conditions. Also provided for is the sending of flowers or similar condolences to ill employees or in case of death of an employee or a member of his immediate family.

This fund is derived from a percentage of gross sales of the post restaurant and is administered by a Civilian Welfare Council. This council made up of the depot are elected yearly. Civilian personnel are given the opportunity to vote in this election and are encouraged toward this end.

Money expended is accounted for as per instructions contained in current regulations, and is subject to audit by higher headquarters. Every effort is made on the part of the Civilian Welfare Council to administer this fund to the fullest advantage of all personnel of the installation. Benefits derived from this fund are great morale factors and go a long way toward increasing efficiency of operations.
