Aware of the almost universal appeal of traditional Dutch food, the sponsors of the Folk Fair, the Pennsylvania Dutch Folklore Center, of Franklin & Marshall College are making preparations to provide for the serving of vast quantities of favorite Dutch dishes.

To date, women of eight churches in Snyder County, in the heart of the central Pennsylvania Dutch-speaking country, are looking forward eagerly to serving their specialties to the largest gathering of appreciative diners in their years of serving church suppers.

These same women — daily practitioners of the famed Pa. Dutch culinary art — are now preparing menus and placing their orders for provisions in anticipation of the four-day Folk Fair. Certain of receiving favored places on these menus will be such traditional delicacies as chicken bot bol, shnitz un gnepp, fastnachts, spare-ribs and sauergraut and string beans baked with ham.

Other Dutch specialties food-loving fairgoers have to look forward to are homemade bread shoofly pie, rivvel soup, and various other dishes. And while authorities point out that the famed "seven sweets and seven sours" of a traditional Pennsylvania Dutch meal actually grew out of a myth, it is one myth which will receive a lot of popular support whenever it is mealtime—which will be all the time—during the impending Folk Fair.

When fairgoers are not eating, it is just such interesting facets of Pennsylvania Dutch folklore as the "seven sweets and seven sours" myth that will be explained to the uninitiated in what may be termed the "Food for Thought" department.

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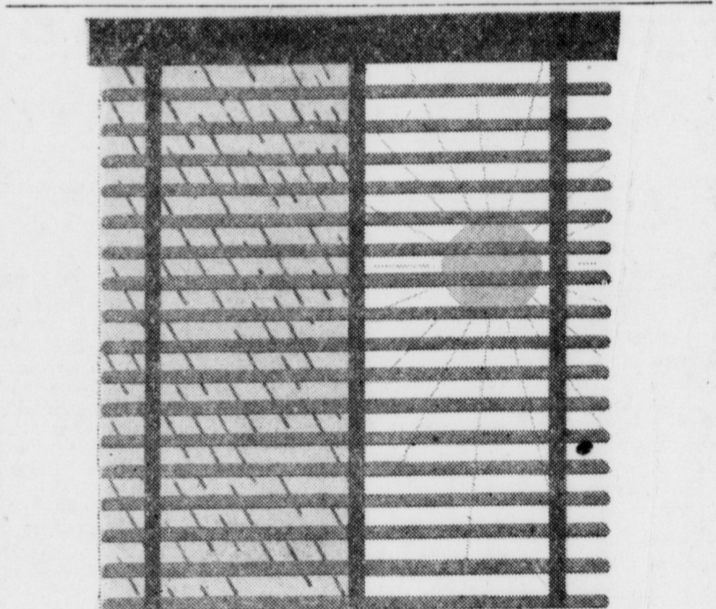
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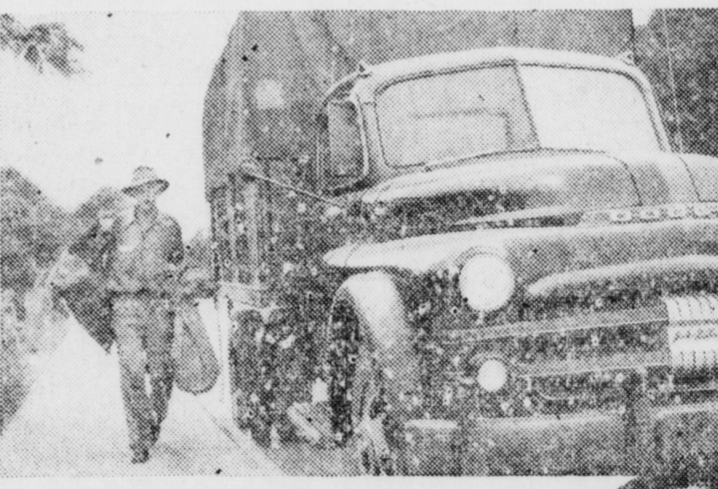
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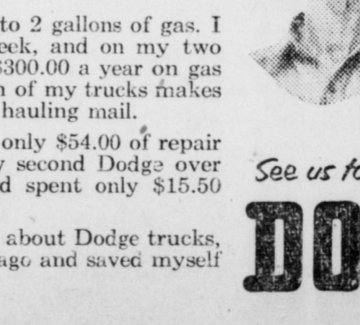
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
