Zimmerman team came back fighting. Divet opened the second with a smash to third base, after stealing second, going to third on a fielder's choice he scored on a fly ball by Ditzler to left field. McCue's team again retaliated by scoring two runs in the bottom of the second inning, on two hits by William and Gohn. No scoring for Zimmerman's squad in the top of the third, but again the rampaging McCuemen scored three more runs on two hits by Pennell and Harnish, mixed with two errors. With the score 6 to 1 against them the Zimmerman's came up with four big runs in the top of the fourth. Hits by Watkins, Kitzler, Harnish, Snyder, plus an error scored on these runs. No more runs were scored until the sixth inning when McCue men put 3 hits together with an error and scored two more runs. The Zimmerman tried hard in the top of the seventh but could do no better than one run, thru a hit by Snyder. Final score McCue's team 8, Zimmerman's 5.
