S. H. S. Corporation's bids for plumbing, heating and ventilation were considered lowest for those contracts. The bid of Roy Reidenbaugh, Lititz, was low for electrical installations.

The reason for the delay in awarding contracts is the difficulty in selling the bonds necessary to finance the project because of the low rate of interest. The Donegal jointure's issue is 2 1/2 percent as originally proposed and investors are beginning to demand more interest.
