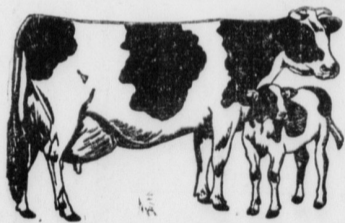

# Farm Calender

**HENS NEED WATER** - The poultryman who expects his laying hens to keep on shelling out eggs must fulfill his share of the bargain and give them plenty of water. F. H. Leuschner, extension poultry specialist of the Pennsylvania State College, says that 100 laying hens will drink about 5 gallons of water a day.

**PRACTICE SAFETY** - Petroleum products can be servant or destroyer. It all depends on how they are used, reminds Joseph A. McCurdy, extension agricultural engineer of the Pennsylvania State College. He explains that the gases and vapors from these products may be ignited by a flame, a spark, or excessive heat.

**COWS NEED COMFORT** - Shade and plenty of fresh water are necessary to keep cows comfortable in hot weather, declares Joe Taylor, Penn. State extension dairy specialist. If shade is not available, it will help if the cows are brought to the barn during the heat of the day so they can loaf in a shed.

**SAVE FOLIAGE** - When you cut flowers that grow from bulbs, cut the foliage sparingly. John Meszaros, Penn State extension floriculturist, says that the foliage left on the plant helps to make food to be stored in the bulb, to produce better flowers next year.

**PAINT METAL ROOFS** - If metal roofs on farm buildings need painting, do the job while the weather is warm, reminds Charles G. Burress, Penn State extension agricultural engineer. The roofs must be dry and free from dust and dirt. Paint all rusted spots first.

**MOVE RANGE EQUIPMENT** - Move feeders and watering equipment on the poultry range to avoid creating bare spots and mud holes, says Carl O. Dossin, Penn State extension poultry specialist.

# Fast, Efficient Way To Fertilize Shown

**Liquid Nitrogen Sprayed  
On 1,000 Acres by Plane**

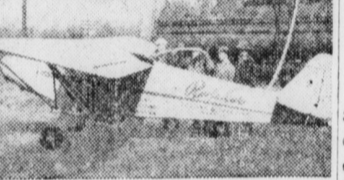
How to fertilize a 1000-acre field in a day was recently demonstrated in Madison County, Ohio.

A new liquid nitrogen product was used. The feat was made possible by direct transfer of the fertilizer from a railroad tank car to a small plane on a landing field adjacent to the train siding. The loaded plane flew to a farm 20 miles away, sprayed the wheat field, and returned to the siding for another load, all in about 15 minutes. Six thousand gallons, in all, were used in this first rail-plane fertilizing operation.

The railroad predicted a large-scale system of fueling centers for liquid fertilizer in the future.

For many farmers, the event recalled other chapters in the story of railroad agricultural development and assistance to farmers.

On March 1, 1911, in Broome County, New York, the first county agent in the United States was hired at the suggestion of a Lackawanna vice president. The railroads, in fact, paid part of his salary. Subsequently, many eastern railroads established their own agricultural departments, and worked with the agricultural colleges, running farm demonstration trains into rural communities. Soil conservation, better livestock breeding, now

These agencies engage in educational work among farmers and shippers to see that the farmer's products get to market in as good condition as they leave the farm.

All this, of course, is not pure philanthropy. The railroads, which are self-supporting and operating on narrow profit margins, feel their stake in American agriculture is great.

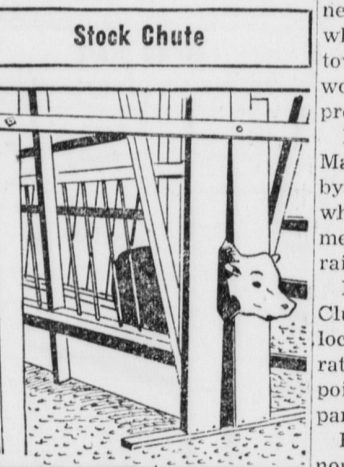
## Four Grassland Tours Planned for August

Four grassland tours of typical agricultural areas in the United States are being planned for the benefit of visitors from other countries to the sixth International Grassland Congress, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announces. The tours are planned for August 17 to 23.

As now planned the tours will be to New England, the south, the midwest and the west. Delegates and members of the congress, attendance is estimated at 2,500, will have their choice of tours.

The congress is being sponsored by the United States government and the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and will be held at Pennsylvania State College.

The tours are designed to demonstrate accomplishments in grass farming in this country and Canada, both on actual farms and in research and educational institutions.



The above stock chute or squeeze is the idea of a Future Farmer of America boy. He built it from salvaged iron and lumber for use on his father's farm. The steel rods were secured in such a manner they could be removed for branding, vaccinating, etc. A farmer handy with tools could use the above sketch as the starting point for a stock chute to fill his own needs.

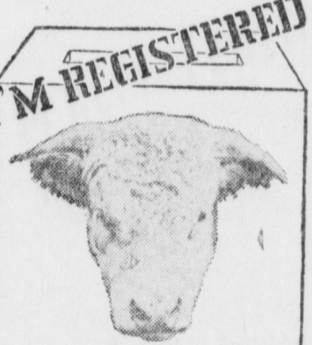
