All Phases Of Pa. Dutch Life At Fair Aug. 29

Complete Personnel Is Published This Week

No phase of Pennsylvania Dutch life will be overlooked during the four-day Pennsylvania Dutch Folk Fair at Selinsgrove, Pa., being staged August 29 to September 1.

The assurance was given today by Dr. Alfred L. Shoemaker, director of the Pennsylvania Dutch Folklore Center of Franklin & Marshall College, sponsor of the event. Purpose of the Folk Fair is to re-awaken interest in all things Dutch in the central Pennsylvania area.

Powwow, square dancing, bundling, hex signs and amish blue gates are but a sampling of the subjects that will come in for interesting discussion and explanation by experts in each field.

Fairgoers will receive demonstrations of powwow by one of today's best known practitioners, 81-year-old Aunt Sophia Bailer. Aunt Sophia, who lives in Tremont, in Schuylkill County, points out that powwow is not witchcraft, but actually stems from the early Christian Church.

Square dance teams from 3 counties, Snyder, Union and Northumberland, will compete for the square dance championship of central Pennsylvania. Judging will be based on the precision and ability of executing traditional Dutch dance figures.

Folk songs, folk tales, Pennsylvania Dutch arts and crafts of all sorts identified Pennsylvania region will be displayed and demonstrated with prominence. Artisans who will demonstrate their crafts right on the grounds include a tinsmith, glass-blower, blacksmith and several others, along with on-the-spot exhibits of soap-making and boiling apple-butter.

Continuous entertainment, afternoon and evening, will be presented in the Main Program Tent for the uninitiated, while Readings famed G. Gilbert "Die Wunnernaas" Snyder will act as master of ceremonies for the outstanding personalities who will entertain in the Dialect Tent.

When not absorbing culture at the program tents and exhibits, fairgoers can absorb culinary efforts of eight different church groups—artists in their own right—who will be serving the traditional Pennsylvania Dutch food which definitely will be one of the highlights of the fair.

This tremendous program will be crammed into four days at the Selinsgrove Fairgrounds, starting Friday, August 29th. Selinsgrove is conveniently located 45 miles north of Harrisburg and five miles south of Sunbury, on Route 15.

To Investigate Two Fires Near Milton Grove

Fire Chief Ray Myers, Mount Joy, said he will ask Fire Marshall Paul Z. Knier to assist in an investigation of the two fires that caused considerable damage to the structures on farms of Ira Heisey, Elizabethtown R3 and Arthur Gingrich. The Gingrich farm is located near the Heisey property.

Both fires were of undetermined origin. The Gingrich fire was August 6th.

Damage was estimated at about \$30,000, caused from the fire August 24 on the Ira Heisey farm. The fire destroyed the barn, a large chicken house with 300 laying hens, a milking machine and cooler, about an acre and a half of tobacco, nine acres of baled straw and 28 bu. seed wheat.

Firemen from Mt. Joy, Elizabethtown and Rheems saved the Heisey dwelling. Neighbors saved a tractor. Several cows were in the field at the time.

Chief Myers said the fire appeared to start in the center of the barn.

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Lemon Snow
3 Tablespoons cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup water
2 slightly beaten egg yolks
1 Tablespoon soft butter
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
2 Tablespoons lemon juice
2 stiffly beaten egg whites

Mix cornstarch, sugar and salt in saucepan. Stir in gradually milk, water and syrup. Cook and stir over boiling water until smooth. Then cover and cook 15 minutes, stirring often. Stir into egg yolks. Cook and stir 2 minutes longer. Remove from heat. Stir in butter, lemon rind and lemon juice. Fold egg whites into hot mixture. Put into 4 dessert dishes. Chill. Keep chilled until ready to serve.
