onto the engine, and the tractor was immediately enveloped in flames.

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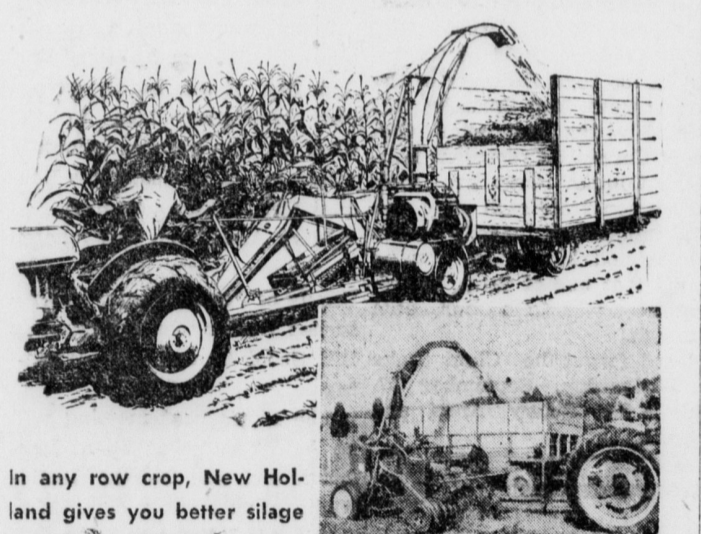
