Enrollment Announced

A combined enrollment of 790 pupils in the grade and high school has been announced by J. W. Bingham, supervising principal. In the Florin Washington Elementary school, there are 57 in first grade, 18 in second; 22 in third; 23 in fourth; 30 in fifth and 17 in sixth. In Maytown, there are 36 in first; 40 in second; 35 in third; 43 in fourth; 37 in fifth and 38 in the sixth. A total in the grade schools of 396.

Park ave. residents would like a street light placed on the left side of Park Ave. but no action was taken on this request.

The session closed with members authorizing the payment of bills totaling \$9,205.04.
