Fire Prevention Week Will Be Observed Here

The avowed purpose of a fire department is "the protection of life and property against hazardous situations". Hazardous situations may be due to fire, wind, flood, explosion, etc., but the purpose stands for any and all. The idea of protection includes only the situation after the thing has happened, but the active fire department goes farther than that. It attempts to prevent the hazardous situation from occurring, that is, they practice fire prevention as well as fire protection.

October 5th through 11th is "FIRE PREVENTION WEEK." This is the week set aside for each of us to check and inspect our surroundings for hazardous situations, and to correct or have corrected, each and every one we find.

Let us take a brief look at the records—Every Day there are 849 home fires . . . 34 deaths by fire . . . 79 store fires . . . 88 factory fires . . . 39 church fires . . . 8 school fires . . . 4 hospital fires . . . costing us more than \$2,000,000 in destroyed property alone.

Only a few of fire's causes—

The number of large loss fires in 1951 increased 24 percent over the previous year and caused 40 percent more damage. The first six months of this year show a 6 percent increase over 1951 (Jan. to July 1st only).

Almost one-third of this land of ours is forest land—630,000,000 acres. And every year in the United States over 200,000 fires burn and scar about 30,000,000 acres. More than a twentieth of our woodland is burned and damaged every year.

Each year enough saw-timber trees are destroyed to supply the building needs of a city of over a quarter of a million people. The saw-timber that goes up in flames is enough to build 36,000 five-room homes. Forest fires destroy enough pulp-size trees each year to produce 3 1/4 million tons of newsprint, enough to supply every newspaper in the United States for 12 months.

Next week we will have Check Lists for the home, for the business place, and for the factory. These will serve as a guide in making a complete and thorough inspection.
