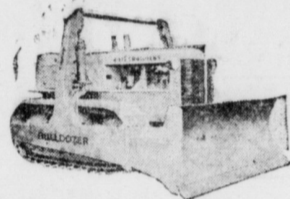

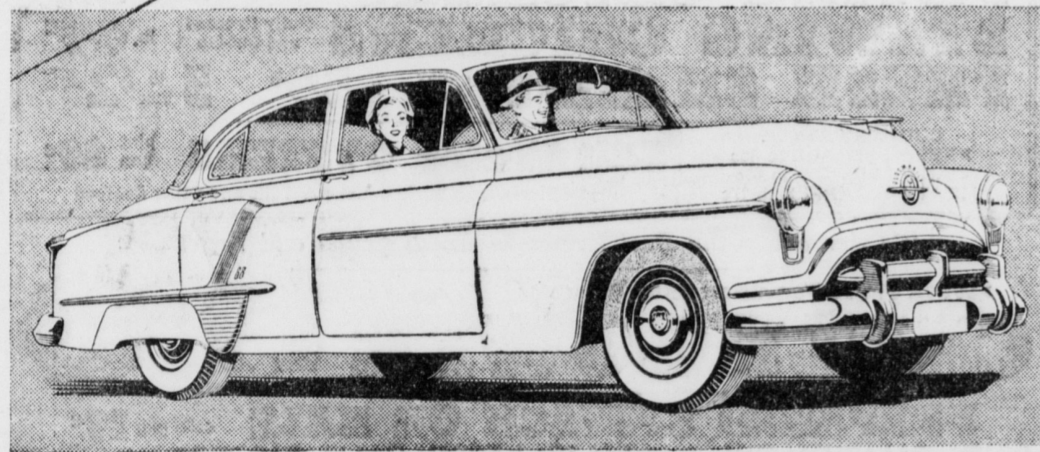

The farms have been collectivized—that leaves only four.



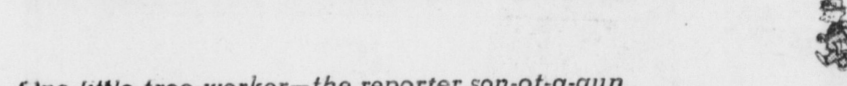
Four little free workers—'till the government did decree
