Farm Calender

FEATHERS NEEDED—There are many commercial uses of feathers. Harry Kauffman, Pa. State extension poultry specialist, explains that waterfowl feathers have the best qualities. They are not so brittle as the feathers from land birds, and the oil in the feathers helps to preserve the keeping qualities.
KILL THE RATS—The cost of keeping a rat has gone up from \$2 to about \$5 a year. Edgar Udine, extension entomologist of the Pennsylvania State College, says you don't have to pay this bill unless you want to do so. Get detailed information from your county agent on how to kill rats with red squill or warfarin.
TAKE SOIL INVENTORY—A good way to take an inventory of the soil is to get a soil sample mailing kit from the county agent's office, one for each field or portion of field on which information is wanted. Take the sample according to directions and mail to Penn. State's soil testing laboratory. A report will be returned.
USE WOODEN POSTS—Farmers will use more wooden and fewer steel fence posts because of steel shortages this fall. Walter W. Simonds, Penn State extension forester, says that posts with more heartwood will last longer than posts having a lot of sapwood.
CARE FOR EVERGREENS—Winter is the critical time for newly planted evergreens on the home grounds, says A. C. Rasmussen, Penn State extension ornamental horticulturist. Apply a 4-inch mulch of well-rotted hardwood sawdust, oak leaves, or peat moss around plants.
SAVE FINGERS—Don't let corn-picking time turn into finger-picking time, warns Penn. State extension agricultural engineers. Shut off power of your corn picker before trying to unclog it.

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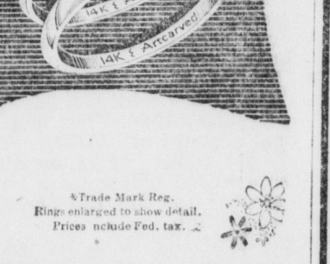
