 The sophomore class saw the movie "Ivanhoe" on Wednesday morning.

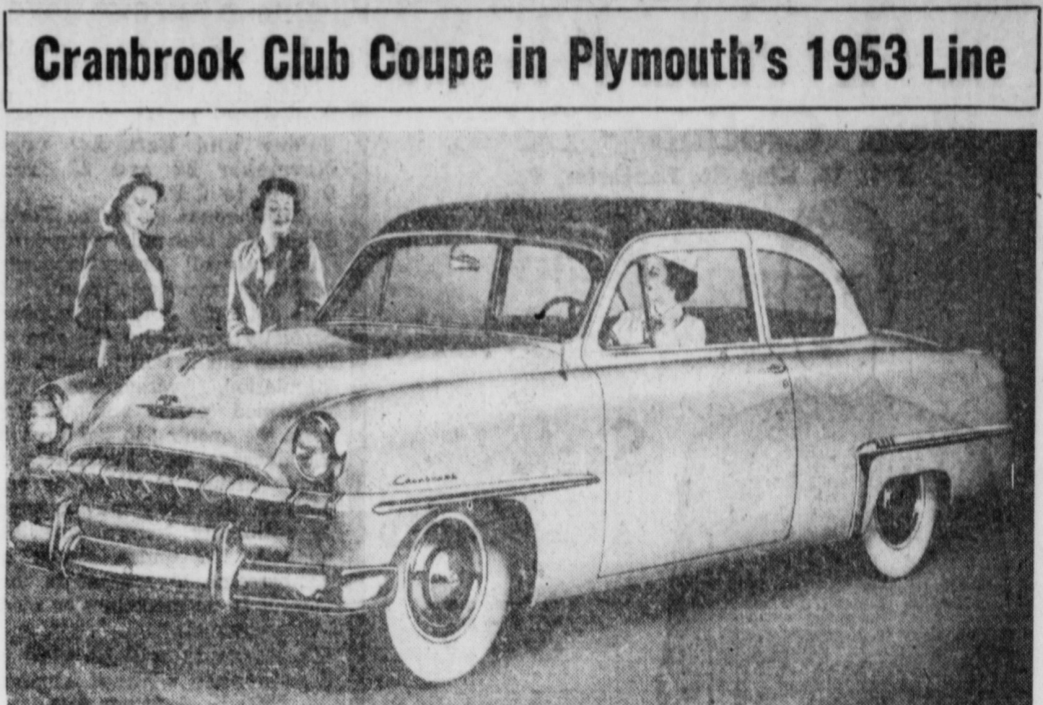
U. N. Essay Date Changed
