**Farm Calendar**

**POISON THE RATS**—To avoid feeding extra livestock around the farm, Edgar Udine, Penn State extension entomologist, urges setting warfarin stations where the rats will get something they may not be looking for. Five stations for the average-sized farm will be enough to poison the rat population, he says.

**PROTECT WATER LINES**—If there is danger of outside water lines freezing, Joseph McCurdy, Penn State extension agricultural engineer, suggests burying them in the ground below frost level. Inside lines can be covered with insulation, or more simply protected by use of one of the electric heating cables.

**PLANT XMAS TREES**—If you have a living Christmas tree, after the holiday season set it in its tub in a cool part of the cellar and water thoroughly for several weeks, says Walter Simonds, Penn State extension forester. After that it may be placed outdoors.

**WINTER FIRE HAZARD**—In winter, chances of having a fire are about a third more than in other seasons, remind Penn State farm safety specialists. They urge removal of all fire hazards and providing some form of fire-fighting equipment.

**BREED GOOD STOCK**—Good hatching eggs require good breeding stock, according to the Penn State extension poultry specialists. They urge poultrymen to get their replacement stock from reliable breeders so that their flocks will continually be improved.

**TEST POTATO SAIL**—Elmer Pifer, Penn State extension agronomist, believes that potato growers should have their soils tested. In the 200 tests made this year, it was found that phosphorus was the most deficient element, with potash next.

**SPANISH SPREAD**  
Canned pimientos mashed and mixed with one-fourth cup butter or substitute with salt to taste makes an excellent "Spanish" spread for potato chips or crackers.

looks okay. He considers defrosters extremely important and said they should be in good working order.

For dependable traction on ice or hard packed snow, the chief recommended equalized brakes and tire chains. He quoted from a recent report by the National Safety Council in making the following comparisons of the same car, traveling at a speed of 20 miles per hour:

On hard packed snow, conventional synthetic rubber tires stop in about 70 feet.

Winterized tires still take about 60 feet.

Tire chains can stop in 40 ft.

"Of all methods to increase traction and reduce stopping distances under snow and ice conditions, tire chains have consistently showed by far the best performance, according to the National Safety Council report, said Chief Neiss."

"The Council also recommends that the safest and most important rule for drivers to follow in winter is to slow down, even with help of tire chains," the chief observed.

would adhere strictly to home in some ways, affect Mount Joy rule principles in placing the responsibility for the maintenance of high plumbing standards, on the municipalities with the State acting in a supervisory capacity, with a few exceptions, and generally only in the event a municipality failed to accept its responsibility in the matter.

Requirements governing the plumbing and house and building drainage in all the cities, boroughs, towns and townships are stipulated in the law. Provisions are included for inspection of such work, and enforcement of the law. The State Department of Health, and municipal officials designated as its agents, will be empowered to provide for the examination, licensure and registration of persons, firms, corporations and authorities engaged in plumbing or house and building drainage.

It was decided to make a further study of the measure before submitting it to the next session of the Pennsylvania General Assembly.
