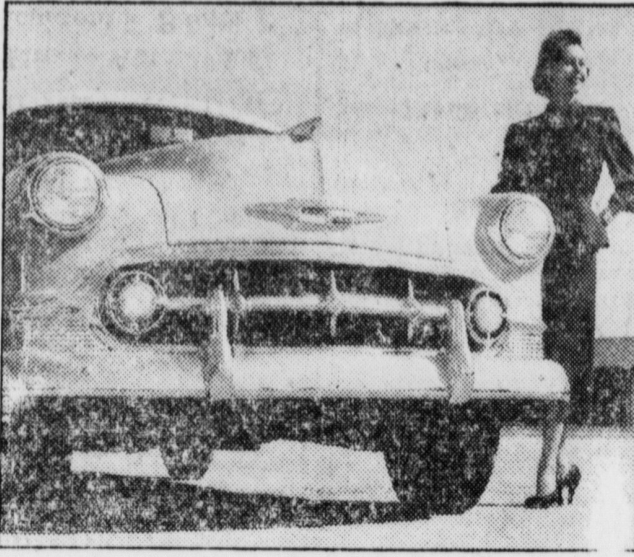
The Independent Band presented a ton of coal to the person holding No. 226.

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO
 January 12, 1938

R. officials stated a 125 car train was passing over the Crossing when a truck from under a box car broke loose and bounced under the wheels of the gondola following. Watchman John Myers was on duty when the wreck occurred.

A townsman Albert "Pud" Hershey presented the editor with a copy of the Mount Joy Star of July 6, 1876. L. M. Gallagher was editor and publisher. The paper is a 7 column four page paper in a Historic edition. An article told of the Indians at the Cove, the big Indian battle between the two Chickies creeks, of Washington spending a night at Big Chickies Tavern, east of here, much about Donegal Springs, the small Army Mount Joy sent to Bainbridge
