year period from 1940 to 1950 the population had only a slight increase of 151 persons. This is an unhealthy condition, stated the Attorney and when we see that only 5 new houses were constructed in 1951, something should be done to remedy this condition. He also stated that real estate values have not kept pace with other communities.

New Industries. Only two new industries were acquired by the borough in a 25 year period, stated Newcomer, and where can industry locate in Mount Joy at the present time? It would have a hard time locating, as it has been almost completely zoned out.

Merger suggested. Attorney Newcomer suggested that a merger with Florin would be a big help to each community. This merger would enable the residents of Florin to take advantage of the police department and in all probabilities there would be a large savings in water rent.

First Improvement. The first on the list of community improvements is the E. Donegal Joint High School, stated the Attorney. The School Authority and directors should be congratulated for the many hours of their time that was given in formulating plans, etc. The next big forthcoming improvement is the new sewage system. This has been talked about for 20 years but nothing has been done about it until now and most industries demand sewage service.

Attorney Newcomer closed his talk with the statement that Mount Joy cannot afford to sit around complacently any longer and that a Community Development Council is urgently needed.

Bailey relates experience. Maurice Bailey, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce stated that he had sent letters to industry and some business firms in Mt. Joy Borough requesting employment figures. Although the returns are not quite completed, Bailey stated he found that 1098 persons were employed, 651 of these were male and 447 female. 452 of the total number lived outside the borough.

Patience Needed. Burgess Fish stated at the meeting that the borough is going through a transition and everyone should be patient. We know there are inconveniences now, stated the Burgess, and these inconveniences must be taken in their stride in Mt. Joy is to move ahead. The men working on these projects are putting in more time than the average man puts in at his livelihood, some without remuneration except community spirit. These men should not be censured, but should be congratulated for this spirit.

Decoration Committee. Arthur Sprecher, chairman of the Christmas Decorations Committee, gave a report on the cost of the decorations and the effort put forth in an endeavor to have Mount Joy's Main Street carry the Christmas Spirit.

The C. of C. was represented by Edward Lane, Arthur Sprecher and Simeon Horton.

Braking Distance On Ice Doubles As Temperature Rises

"How slippery is a warm ice cube?" Chief of Police Parke Neiss explained today that the question isn't as silly as it sounds: "Temperature has a great deal to do with the slipperiness of ice," he said.

This important fact was noted by the Committee on Winter Driving Hazards of the National Safety Council.

The Committee found that braking distance from a speed of 20 miles per hour averages about 110 feet on ice when the temperature is near zero.

But when the temperature gets around the melting point (32 degrees), braking distances average as much as 250 feet.

"In other words," Chief Neiss warned, "braking distances on ice may be doubled within a relatively short time as the temperature rises."

He explained that many drivers start out early on a cold morning and find that traction is quite good. They adjust their driving habits accordingly. However, a few hours later the temperature may have risen considerably; and the surface that was providing slightly dangerous traction now becomes very treacherous for the unwary driver.

In addition to reducing speed, wise drivers safeguard against this unexpected difference in the slipperiness of ice by using tire chains, the chief cautioned.
