Miss Gerlitzki, a ninth grade pupil in Mt. Joy High School, a soprano, sang on the show. She also received a bracelet from the station.

The gift from the class was presented by Miss Sandra Forwood on Sunday evening during their meeting. Stories were read of how some of the sacred songs came to be written and the group joined in singing of the songs.
