Pedestrian

1. While a pedestrian has, under the law, the right of way at a crossing — reason and logic must be combined with practical reality when interpreting what is meant by right of way.

2. Where both pedestrians and traffic have the green light at intersections, it would be impracticable for motorists to wait until crossings were clear of pedestrians before making their turn.—If that were required, traffic would likely be paralyzed for 15 minutes or a couple of hours a day at busy intersections . . .

3. Frequently a car comes within a couple inches or a foot of pedestrians. This near contact does not per establish either negligence on the part of the driver or contributory negligence on the pedestrian.

Boy Scout Week, Feb. 7 to 13, marking the 43rd anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America, will be observed throughout the nation by more than 3,250,000 boys and adult leaders. Since 1910, more than 20,200,000 boys and men have been members.

Interests of boys in three age groups: Cub Scouting for boys 8, 9 and 10; Boy Scouting for those 11, 12 and 13 and Exploring for boys 14 and up. The high point of Scouting in 1953 will be the third National Jamboree. More than 50,000 Boy Scouts will camp at a 3,000-acre tract in the Irvine Ranch in the Newport Harbor area of southern California next July 17 to 23.

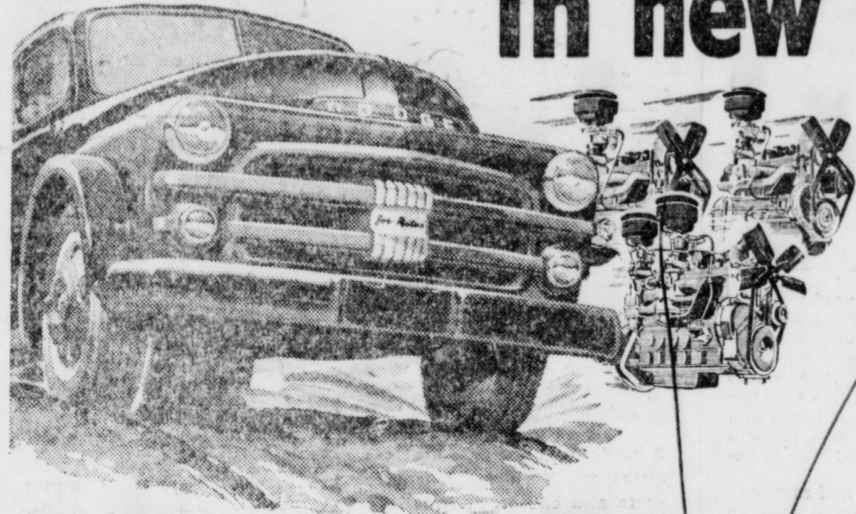
