Civil Defense Is As Important As Training A Soldier, Says Military Authority

A civil defense meeting will be held in the Greist Building, Lancaster, Monday evening at 7:30. Men and women, who are interested in becoming a member of the civil defense auxiliary police are urgently asked to attend. All persons interested are asked to contact Chief of Police Parke Neiss, Mt. Joy.

The need for a proper civil defense program was recently brought out by military authorities when it was emphatically stated that, should the U. S. be attacked, the soldier in the front line would be safer than the civilian, as the soldier is trained to meet emergencies while the civilian is complacently sitting at home and doing nothing about it. "It just could not happen to me says friend civilian", when in reality friend civilian would be safer in the front lines.

Guided missiles and atom bombs have made the United States vulnerable for attack and the only means to save us from heavy casualties in case of a war is for public spirited men and women to take an active part in civil defense. It can happen here as it did in England during World War II.

3,106 miles were traveled in making home visits — 230 of which were for physical therapy, and 103 follow up.

67 visits were made to the office; 62 for physical therapy, and 5 for follow up.

4 corrective swimming classes were held; 11 children made 21 visits.

Census Suggested To Enable Collector To Secure Those Names

The Borough Fathers seem to be having a hard time making both ends meet. This was brought out at council meeting Monday night when the councilmen passed a resolution to borrow \$6,000 to pay current bills.

It wouldn't be necessary to borrow this money, stated Councilman Spangler, if a census were taken for new residents in the borough. We all know, he said, that the borough is losing several thousand dollars in head taxes because these persons are not known to the tax collector.

Spangler also brought out that the borough formerly had revenue from the water accounts and this money today is not going to the borough but to the Water Authority.

George Brown, 3rd, tax collector, suggested to council that the head tax should fall due on April 1 so as to coincide with county taxes. However, Fire Chief Ray Myers brought out to the councilmen that it was his opinion it would be a hardship on the taxpayer as water rents fall due at that time.

Exonerations
Council passed a resolution to exonerate the tax collector for the amount of \$65.00 for 1952 per capita tax. These exonerations were hardship cases, armed forces and persons who had moved from the borough.

Councilman Spangler stated that even though the exonerations were small, it was a loss to the borough and in his opinion it is necessary to be able to add new residents to the tax collectors files in order to move ahead.

Building Of Standpipe Endorsed By Borough Council

The councilman Monday nite made a motion to endorse the Borough Authority in order to build the standpipe at David & Lumber Streets by changing the zone. The question was also brought up as to who is responsible for resurfacing the streets. Council President Zerphey said that a member of the Water Authority had stated to him that Contractor Rosser is following up and resurfacing is being done as fast as conditions permit.

Councilman Bailey said that a Community Development Committee for new industry, as suggested by Attorney Clarence Newcomer, was being organized and that a member of council should be on the committee.
