"It just could not happen to me says friend civilian", when in reality friend civilian would be safer in the front lines.

Guided missles and atom bombs have made the United States vulnerable for attack and the only means to save us from heavy casualities in case of a war is for public spirited men and women to take an active part in civil defense. It can happen here as it did in England during World War II.
