Dedication Of New Church Parsonage Will Be Held Sun. At E. U. B. Church, Florin

The new parsonage of Gloss-brenner Evangelical United Brethren church will be dedicated Sunday afternoon at 2:30 with Bishop George Edward Epp, bishop of the Eastern area of the E.U.B. Church, delivering the dedication address.

The three choirs of the church will participate in the ceremony. The Senior choir, under the direction of Mr. Gene Sword, selection to be "My God and I". The Seraph choir will sing "Nearer To The Heart of God".

Others taking part in the ceremony will be Rev. Ezra H. Ranek, pastor of the St. Mark's E.U.B. Church, who will give the dedicatory scripture.

In behalf of the congregation, trustees and building committee, Mr. Jacob Stehman will make the presentation of the key to new parsonage to Dr. Young, who will present it to Rev. and Mrs. John Gable, presiding pastor and wife.

Under the leadership of this trustworthy committee and the congregation members a new church school unit was built and dedicated November 23rd, 1952.

The beautiful Colonial-style brick parsonage, adjoining the church, completes the building program.

The house, modern in every detail, has three bedrooms and tile bath on the second floor and a complete attic. The downstairs has a spacious living-room, dining room, modern kitchen, powder room, and pastor's study.

The "Pretzel Man" Familiar Figure In This Area For 50 Years Was Buried Tuesday

John E. Bloom, known in this county by young and old as the "pretzel man" passed away on Saturday at his home, 410 S. Prince St., Lancaster, after an illness of six weeks.

Bloomie, as he was called by many, made his last appearance in Mt. Joy during the holiday season. A member of his family said when he came home from his last trip to Mt. Joy, he remarked "There was too many bake sales to compete with and guess I'd better wait until the holidays were over."

He was a familiar figure on the streets of Mt. Joy and vicinity and at the sales with his tray of candies, gum and the "soft pretzels" which gave him the name of "the pretzel man."

He had been selling them for approximately 50 years.

In his youth, the family said, he was a boxer and competed in marathons as a fast walker.

He was born in Germany, a son of the late William and Margaret Peitch Bloom. Surviving are these children: Catherine, wife of Frank Laube; Mary E., wife of Ernest Rissinger; Edward J., Anna M., wife of John Henrich; Margaret, wife of Frederick Rineer; Helen E., wife of Robert L. Wakefield; Elizabeth, wife of Alfred J. Ward; Timothy D., and Richard C., all of Lancaster; also 21 grandchildren, 4 great grandchildren and one sister, Mrs. Mary Kolb, of Lancaster.

Dental Health Poster Contest

A Dental Health poster contest is being conducted in the Mount Joy Borough schools, under the supervision of Mrs. Beryl Hahn, art instructor. Each child in the schools has been urged to compete for the prizes to be awarded in the assembly programs to be held in the High School auditorium on Friday afternoon, February 13, 1953.

The contest is conducted to help impress upon our children the importance of better dental health. The judges for the contest are Mrs. J. Bruce Greiner and Rev. Robert C. Pike, Methodist Minister. The prizes to be awarded were donated by the Rotary and Lions Clubs of Mt. Joy and by Sloan's Pharmacy.

These posters will be displayed in the Grade School building from February 10 to 13 1953. The public is invited to visit the school and see what the children have accomplished.

A survey of the summaries of the dental examinations conducted each year in grades 1, 2, 5, 7, 9, and 11 shows a steady increase in the amount of dental care given to our children. The correct rate for children examined in 1950 was 48.7%, that for 1951 was 52.1% and for 1952 it was 54%. In the ninth and eleventh grade 92 pupils examined this year have a total of about 2760 teeth. Of these 1001 are already decayed; only 446 of this number have been filled. Three pupils in this group have perfect teeth.

"Don't look now but—your teeth are showing." Teeth are important to good looks. They help you chew your food well, they help you to speak clearly. Teeth are important for your health.

Teeth decay may be reduced by properly cleansing of the teeth, reducing the amount of sweets and pastry carbohydrate foods eaten daily, the use of sodium fluoride, and regular visits to your dentist.
