The Revised Bible

Much discussion, public and private, has been made since the release for sale of the new Revised Standard Version of the Bible.

We shall not attempt to elaborate or enlighten anyone on this subject except to say that a lot of the furor could have been avoided with a proper explanation of the RSV.

It is in actuality merely a revised printing of the King James Version of the Bible. Many persons, we believe, have been under the mistaken impression the Revised Standard Version is a rival version.
