30 YEARS AGO
March 21, 1923
Lancaster city needs 500
houses. Mount Joy is in the
same fix — we need houses too.
The Mount Joy Athletic

Martin Shearer, Rheems pur-
chased 150 chickens at a sale
and while being delivered to
his home, they laid 40 eggs.

Brubaker and Ober, Rheems
village butchers slaughtered
210 hogs and 15 steers during
the winter months for the farm-
ers, many of them coming a dis-
tance of six miles. At present
they were making a half ton of
sausage.

15 YEARS AGO
March 24, 1938
Harry Chertcoff, owner of
the Mt. Joy theatre, held open
house for the community to in-
spect the new theatre, which
was completed that week.

Ed Ream announced he will
open a farmers market in his
spacious building next to his of-
fice on South Barbara street.

Lloyd Shank and family
moved from the B. W. Brown
property on Jacob St., to the
H. A. Darrenkamp property on
East Main St.

The first week of area bovine
TB testing in West Hempfield
revealed only one reactor among
650 head of cattle. Un-
usual record and an indication
of the fine quality of cattle be-
ing raised by nearby farmers.

The Mt. Joy Jr. High basket-
ball team, champions of the
Northern Jr. League, were en-
tertained at a banquet by their
coach, C. Casper Kreider.

CENSUS REPORT ON LANCASTER GENERAL HOSP.

In a census report for Feb-
ruary 1, 128 persons were ad-
mitted to the Lancaster Gener-
al Hospital, it was announced
by Dr. D. C. Smelzer, executive
director of the hospital at a
meeting of the Board of Direct-
ors March 9.

The admitted patients re-
quired 8,874 days of hospital
service. Other census figures
include: Discharge patients -
1100, operations - 1456, births -
250, treated in Receiving Ward -
584, treated in Dispensary -
294 (with 437 visits). Average
number of patients per day was
317. Highest number was 342
on Tuesday, February 17.
