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

School Board Meeting Held The regular monthly meeting of the East Donegal Township School Board was held Friday evening, March 13. Principal Bingeman reported on the expected enrollments in September, 1953. Since more than 70 beginners have registered to study theme, "In the Shadow date, an additional elementary teacher will have to be employed. Several elementary vacancies are also expected because of teacher resignations. Supply bids for the 1953-54 year were opened and referred to the supplies committee for tabulation and study. A communication from the Federal Security Agency indicated that East Donegal Township will receive reimbursement for 106 children under Public Law 874 which provides for financial assistance to school districts with Federally - connected children. If a 100 per cent allotment is approved, East Donegal should receive \$7 .600 for the above students.

In the Shadow

Lesson for March 22, 1953

SUPPOSE Jesus had died five seconds after he was born' What difference would it have made to the Christian religion? One of the most ancient Christian creeds says that the Son of God "was made man." Some theologians have supposed that the Christian religion would be no different if all we knew was that for one single instant the Eternal became man; that if Jesus had died five seconds after he was born, he would still have meant to us all that he can ever mean.

This is surely a grotesque mistake. The New Testament declares that the "word became flesh," that is, was made man; but that is only the start of the story. The four Gospels are there to tell us that the Word became Jesus. It makes all the difference in the world what kind of man God-in the-flesh is.

leaders of men, as Jesus is the true one. They had nothing in common except

most gruesome books of non-fiction is "The Last Days of Hitler,'

Dr. Foreman by H. R. Trevor-Roper (Macmillan 1947). The author, a British Intelligence officer, was sent to find out, from evidence fresh on the spot, what actually happened to Hitler in those last days in Berlin. The story is a terrible one, and the more so for being true. In the days of his glory, Hitler had seemed to millions of people to be a great man. When the disciples fell asleep in Gethsemane, he was not harsh with them, for he knew how weak the flesh can be. Jesus was aware, of his friends' weaknesses and sins. He rebuked the quarrelsome disciples at the supper table. He foretold how they would all forsake him and flee. He knew how much fear there was beneath Peter's brave bragging. Yet he did not spend a single word condemning others, not even Judas The loving and the unloving, the loyal and the uncaring, they were all on Jesus' heart in those dark hours. He lived for others then, no less than in earlier days.

Aware Of God

If ever a man had an excuse for bitterness and revenge, it was Jesus. But his lips and heart were free of both. Fear did not despoil him, because he kept on believing in the Father on high. The shadow of death did not conceal the face of God.
