SECRETARY HORST

Future generations will benefit greatly from conservation practices inaugurated in Pennsylvania since the end of the war, said Miles Horst, Secretary of Agriculture for the Commonwealth, in addressing state and regional Soil Conservation Service employees at a technical conference at the Pennsylvania State College recently.

Secretary Horst, in outlining the steps taken by post-war administrations to preserve our natural resources, stressed the facts that close cooperation between conservation agencies and farmers, and the development of good farming practices, are major factors in soil conservation.

WATERFOWL VARIETIES

Varieties, if not quantity, distinguishes the spring flight of ducks and other waterfowl in Pennsylvania, say birdlife specialists at the Pennsylvania State College. Flocks of Canada geese make non-stop flights over the State but a few of them, with small flocks of ducks and swans, stop to rest on lakes, ponds, reservoirs and streams throughout Pennsylvania in March and early April.

Such areas as Pymatung Wildlife Refuge, Presque Isle in Lake Erie, and the Susquehanna River attract the largest numbers of waterfowl. But a small pond or reservoir may serve as a resting place for a pair of baldpates, scaup ducks, or a lone whistling swan. Occasionally a shoveller in brilliant nuptial plumage can be seen probing for food in the mud of a flooded field with his spatula-like bill. A small stream is often a brief haven for the little buff-head.

Always wary, ducks frequently are seen on rivers and ponds in the vicinity of cities and towns where there is no danger of illegal shooting.
