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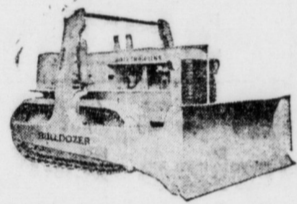

Another card party scheduled by the American Legion Auxiliary is for Monday evening, April 20th at the Legion Home.



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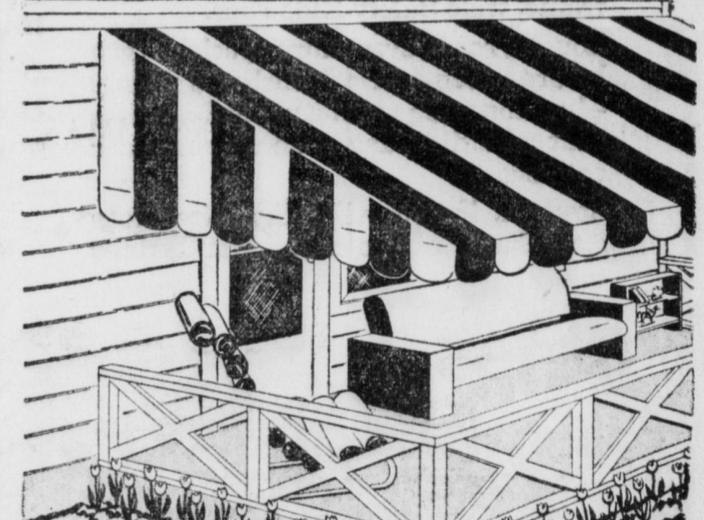
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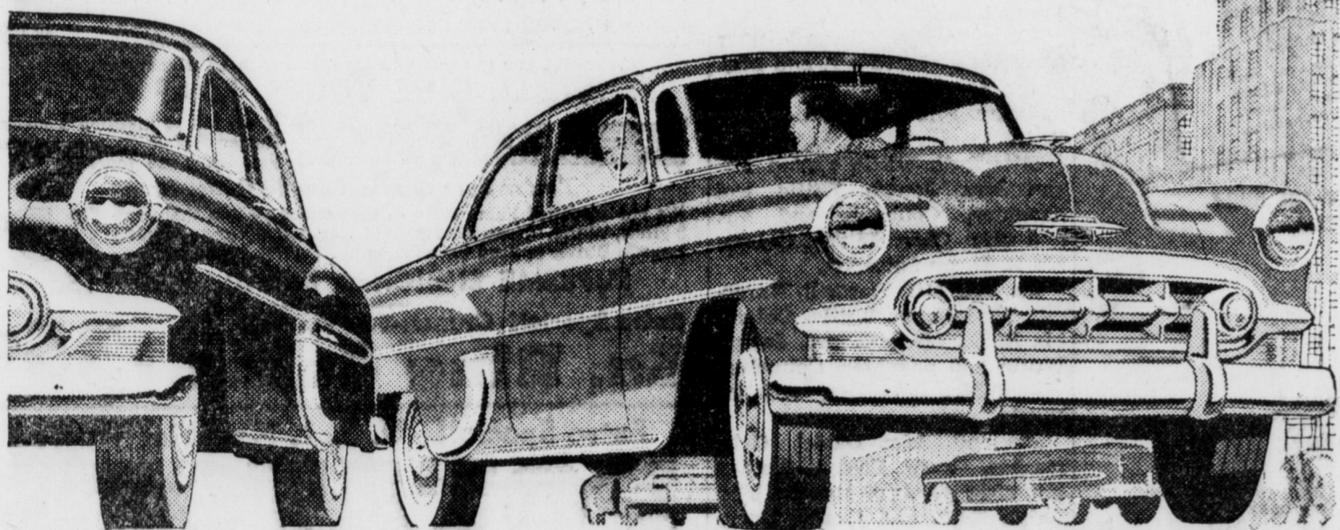
