Lanc. Hospital To Hold Public Tour On Sunday

The Lancaster General Hospital is inviting the public to tour the hospital on Sunday, April 26, between 1 and 4 p. m. DST, in an open house observance of Hospital Day.

The tour route is planned to give the public the chance to see the hospital's facilities in the new building; recently completed facilities in the old building; and some of the sections which are under construction.

Plans are made to speed the tour through the building by conducting the visitors in single file on a route where guides will be stationed to explain points of interest and to direct them to the next section to be viewed.

All visitors are to report at the main entrance at 525 North Duke St., where they will be met by guides and directed to the start of the tour through the building.

Ten main sections, covering more than 25 individual points of interest to the general public, will be on the tour route.

The tour will begin with the dietary department where visitors will see the kitchen with its all new stainless steel equipment; nurse's dining room, and maintenance dining room.

The first part of the tour also will include:

New Central Supply Room, under construction which will furnish space and equipment to sterilize all materials for patients' cars before they are sent to the floors.

New Pharmacy, a complete drug-room where the most up-to-date methods are used.

Receiving Ward, which is equipped with five beds for emergency patients and includes two special rooms for emergency use.

Laboratory, which has been expanded with the addition of four new rooms.

New X-ray section under construction.

Men's Medical Ward, recently renovated, and including numerous new facilities such as water, sun porch, utility rooms, and nurse's stations.

Men's Surgical Ward, with 2 new wards providing for three beds each, and new utility room.

The second part of the tour will start on the second floor of wards, which has many new features similar to the Men's Ward floors.

From there the tour will continue through the portion which is now under construction, and where the new Genito-Urinary Department will be located when work is completed.

Entering the new wing of the building, the visitors will view the facilities for patients in the semi-private rooms.

These include the sun porch, nurse's station with modern equipment; utility room; detention room for isolation.

Returning to the first floor, the tour will cover the Heart Clinic; Record Room; Memorial Prayer Room; Library and Board Room; Lounge; Administrative offices; and conclude at the Hospitality Shop.

The open house tour is arranged by Mrs. Walter F. Kaufman, president of the United Auxiliaries to the Hospital. The groups of guides will be in charge of the following: Dr. Joseph Appleyard, professional staff; Dr. D. C. Smelzer, administrative staff; Mrs. Edythe Kistner, nurses; Leslie S. Hubbard, board of directors; and the presidents of the individual auxiliaries.

Usually the institution observes Hospital Day later in the spring at the same time as the national observance. This year's celebration at the General is set on a date to coincide with official opening of the 1953 Charity and Maintenance Campaign which gets underway on April 24 with a goal of \$108,540.

However, the committee emphasized that the Open House observance is open to the general public, free of charge, and no solicitation for funds is conducted in connection with the hospital tour.

Residents are reminded that children under twelve are not permitted to visit the hospital at any time.

throughout the nation next Monday evening will be used for this purpose. The money is divided as follows: 25 per cent for cancer research in university and hospital medical centers; 15 per-cent to the national organization for training doctors in diagnosis and treatment of cancer; 60 per-cent to be used locally in obtaining dressings for cancer patients, to build up funds for the community nurse and to transport patients to Lancaster for treatment.

In urging the generous support of the local campaign, the local chairmen pointed out that there is no age immune to cancer and that it annually kills more children than does polio.
