Farm Calendar Sr. Girl Scouts

Use Good Sires — To improve the type and quality of livestock, use better sires. Thomas King, Penn State extension livestock specialist, says that too many farmers are using inferior sires. These animals should have been used for meat instead of breeding. They transmit weaknesses that will take generations to correct.

Sawdust for Mulch — Home gardeners can use sawdust to good advantage as mulch on their vegetable plots. Sawdust is generally available in large quantities. It will not only conserve moisture when used as a mulch but will keep the soil cool in hot weather.

Read the Label — When using pesticides, be sure to read the label, caution Penn State extension entomologists and plant pathologists. Most recommendations for the control of fruit, garden, and flower pests are made in terms of the actual chemical that does the killing, or a coined name which has been approved for use.

Peel Pulpwood — The bark slips off very easily now on most species of trees. That is the reason that woodsmen and farmers cut trees and peel them for pulpwood at this time of year, says Walter Simonds, Penn State extension forester.

Potatoes Plentiful — Robert Donaldson, Penn State extension marketing specialist, reports that in the late spring group of potato-producing states, the crop will probably be more than a quarter larger than average. There should be plenty of potatoes on the market.

Prevent Egg Soiling — When eggs are gathered several times a day, there are fewer soiled ones to clean, remind Penn State extension poultry specialists.

CARE FOR STRAWBERRIES — Remove the blossoms from newly set strawberry plants to save their energy for producing next year's crop, reminds Carl Bittner, Penn State extension fruit specialist. For the complete story on growing strawberries, ask for county agricultural agent for Extension Circular No. 290.

GROW NEW LEGUMES — One of the newest legumes to be used in Pennsylvania is birdsfoot trefoil. James Eakin, Pennsylvania State extension agronomist, believes it will find a

place on many farms, in the State because of its ability to grow under unfavorable conditions. It is used for both pasture and hay.

PROTECT PLANTS — Henry Menusan, Penn State extension entomologist, suggests that in the home garden, where only a few plants are involved, the easiest way to prevent damage from cutworms is by wrapping a paper collar around the stem of the plant as it is set. Place the collar two inches under ground and two inches above ground.

USE NEW SEED — Do not use seed from last year's hybrid corn crop for planting this year, warns George Berggren, Penn State extension agronomist. Because of the cross-breeding process used in developing hybrid corn, new seed must be used each year to get best yields.

PUT CHICKS ON RANGE — Get the chicks outdoors early, suggests Penn State extension poultry specialists.

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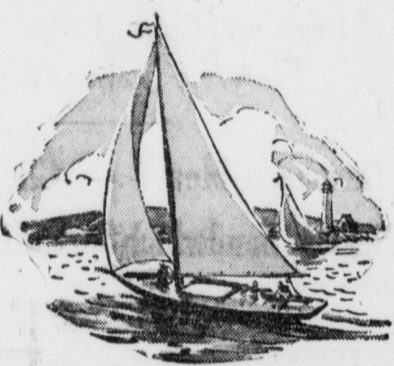


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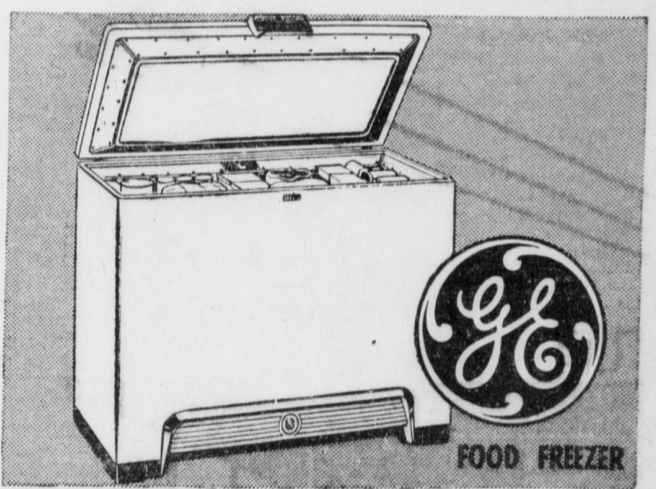
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
