Survey Shows Feeling Divided Over Florin Joining Mt. Joy But Favorable Majority Reported

House-To-House Canvas To Be Completed This Week

Despite a considerable difference of opinion, a majority of residents of Florin favor joining Mount Joy Borough — and regard the need for a sewer system as one of the vital issues.

This was disclosed today by a member of the Florin Citizens committee which is completing a house-to-house survey of Florin to determine sentiment.

"That part of Florin in East Donegal Township is overwhelmingly in favor of being annexed to Mount Joy Borough and feel it will mean a real improvement for them," he asserted. "They feel the need for sewers is just as important and vital to Florin as it is to Mount Joy."

"The only opposition seemingly is coming from the section north of the highway in Mount Joy Township. Here assessments are comparatively low and residents feel they can avoid any possibility of a tax increase."

Council is expected to fill the vacancy by appointment at the next meeting Monday evening, July 6.

Borough Police Clamp Down On Reckless Drivers

Traces Growth Of Aircraft-Marine In Address Here

Rotary Club Holds Ladies Night Tues.; Bennett To Be Installed

The growth of the Mount Joy plant of Aircraft-Marine Products, Inc., from a group of 50 employees to a plant regularly hiring 175 persons was described by Steve Hobar, Aircraft-Marine personnel manager, in a talk before the Mount Joy Rotary Club Tuesday noon.

The company began in a garage in New Jersey with a group of 15 employees but today consists of a dozen production units having a payroll in excess of 1500 persons. They manufacture specialized electrical connections and terminals.

The concern is playing an important role in the defense effort, just as it did during and since World War II. Its other nearest plant at Florin regularly employs a group of 55 persons.

Following his talk, Mr. Hobar showed a talking picture depicting the making of various kinds of terminals and showing them being assembled by automatic machines operating at a speed of 4,000 per hour.

He was introduced by Paul Belsler, head of the local plant.

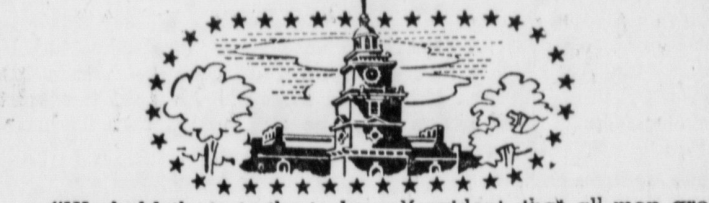
Adam Greer will serve as the program director of the club during the coming month.

Hearing Next Wk. On Application For Taxi Service

Seek Witnesses To Testify In Lanc.; To Provide Free Transportation

A move to take a large number of witnesses to a P. U. C. hearing in Lancaster next Friday morning to testify to the need for a taxi service here was launched today.

According to William W. White, Jr., of Elizabethtown, who operates eight cabs there, service will be inaugurated in Mount Joy and Florin as soon as approval by the Public Utilities Commission. He reported that a number of local industries are joining in the demand for the service.
