children all learned to speak Neopolitan so well that their mothers "would take them shopping and let them do the haggling."

The crew's families lived with Italian families for the most part and, from all reports, promoted Italo-American relations considerably.

Heilig said both the ship and the Italian people always were doing a lot of things for each other. He mentioned the fact that surplus food which would ordinarily have been disposed of in the ship's galley was turned over to Italian orphanage. The ship also staged Christmas parties for the orphans.

The goodwill created aboard by the Adriondack went a little further than the Italians thought. In the recent past the French passenger liner De Lesseps caught fire at Naples. After the fire had been subdued crewmen from the Adriondack pitched in and helped pump out the ship. It also gave meals to 25 French troops in whose sleeping compartment the fire had occurred.

The Adriondack has served as the flagship of Rear Adm. E. A. Cyriac (commander Fleet Air, United States Naval Forces Eastern Atlantic and Mediterranean. Captain Heilig explained that it was a bit unusual for a naval aviation command to be embarked on an Amphibious ship but it was done through a need for office space.

for R. O. T. C. classes several years ago. At that time they had no basis for predicting the 200,000-man reduction in the armed services called for in the new military budget.

Neither the Army nor the Air Force appears to favor forcing the retirement of older officers. They contend that officers who have given many years to the armed forces are entitled to serve out their expected term.

However, a great deal of uneasiness has been created in manpower training circles by the fear that if R. O. T. C. officers are not taken on active duty the Pentagon will be criticized on the ground that it is giving the new officers a "double deferment" from military duty. These officers already have deferment in the expectation that upon graduation they would serve several years on active duty.

The Air Force has forced the issue by suspending, at least temporarily, the call to active duty of about 4,000 of the 7,100 reserve officers who were graduated from colleges last month. The army was understood to have proposed such a suspension but it has had no policy guidance on the matter from the Office of Secretary of Defense.

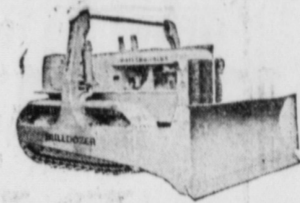
