**Another County Fair Season Is Almost At Hand**

Another County fair season is almost at hand, and fair officials have begun laying the groundwork for the countless contests and competitions which highlight their annual fall harvest festivals.

The Reading Fair, one of Pennsylvania's largest, has long been famed for its unique program of entertainment. Its Grand Circuit horse races are the only such events offered in Pennsylvania, its fine poultry show is one of the largest anywhere, and its exhibits of livestock are regarded as tops in the realm of county fairs.

But there are two other things which the fair at Reading is famous. They are the Reading Fair beauty contest, which offers a first prize of \$1,000 cash, and nine other cash prizes amounting to \$1,300, and the Reading Fair talent contest which offers \$875 in cash prizes and also a paid engagement at the fair to the winner.

When originated, both contests were restricted to folks in the city of Reading and the county of Berks in which it is situated. However, the popularity of the two contests grew with such tremendous leaps and bounds that fair officials were forced to encompass additional territory.

Hence, the beauty contest was opened this year for the first time to the counties of Schuylkill, Lebanon, Lancaster, Chester and Montgomery, as well as Berks, and the talent contest was thrown open to the world.

It goes without saying that Reading Fair officials are now busily engaged in processing entries in both contests. Entries in the beauty contest close Aug. 22, in the talent contest, Aug. 12. Entry forms for either contest can be obtained by writing the Reading Fair, 522 Court Street, Reading, Pa.

Single or married women who have passed the age of 16 by August are eligible in the beauty contest. Either amateurs or professionals may engage in the talent competition. Finals in both contests will be held during Reading Fair week, September 13 to 20.
