'Affairs of State' Opens Today At Gretna playhouse

Gene P. Otto, co-producer at the Gretna Playhouse is no newcomer to the theatre. At the age of nine, he first felt the lure of greasepaint and did something about it. He gathered together his belongings and ran off with the "Sells-Floto" circus. Later he was found outside the side show beating a drum.

With show business in his blood, Gene went on the road in such plays as "The Roundup", "Ben Hur" and "Rip Van Winkle". In the latter show, he played the part of Rip's little boy.

Gene has vivid memories of his one stands with "Uncle Tom's Cabin". It was his job to take care of the bloodhounds and lead them over the parade route. They always had a parade before the show, then a matinee and evening performance. The "Tom" show played Harrisburg, Lancaster, York and other cities of this area. Those were the days when prices were 10, 20 and 30 cents. Incidentally Gene was one of the "darkies" in the production.

In Harrisburg, Mr. Otto took over the Chestnut Street Auditorium and introduced many name stars to this area. As co-producer with Charles F. Coghlan, he is bringing to Mt. Gretna, beginning Aug. 13, "Affairs of State". This is a smart whimsical comedy about a rather unusual triangle set in present day Washington. The story revolves a shy, little school teacher, Katherine Gregg who is persuaded to marry a wealthy Senator, James Cade, to cover his romance with the ambitious wife, Pauline Drake, of an ex-Secretary of State, Harry Sheppard. The temporary wife is a charming, intelligent hostess and secures for the Senator an appointment as Under Secretary of State. All is fair in love and politics. Included in the cast are Wyley Honcock as a member of the State Department and James Ray as the Senator's butler.

Audiences will be happy to find Harry Sheppard back on the Gretna stage. He was seen last Wednesday on the Kraft Television Theatre, televised in New York. "Affairs" runs for one week to and including Aug. 19.

EXPERIMENTAL CEREAL STRAINS SHOW PROMISE

Promising strains of new and improved varieties of cereal grains are undergoing tests at the Pennsylvania State College, according to C. S. Bryner, agronomist in charge of these experiments.

One of the highest yielding varieties of wheat in the 175-strain experimental plots carries a small amount of rye "blood," said Bryner, an indication of the value of such peculiar grains. One of the largest groups of small grains consists of 129 miscellaneous strains of wheat obtained from the U. S. Department of Agriculture. A few of these are exhibiting useful characteristics under Pennsylvania conditions, Bryner said. Of another lot of 39 strains obtained from various experiment stations, perhaps 10 eventually will appear as new varieties.

Pennoll still is the leading wheat variety for this State, consistently outyielding its nearest competitors by two or three bushels per acre in widespread competitive trials.

Reading Fair Beauty Contest Deadline Aug. 22

Reading, Pa.—Contests and competitions continued to occupy the attention of Reading Fair officials this week.

Even though entries in the Reading Fair talent contest officially closed Wednesday at midnight, there was no relief in sight for the hard working fairmen. They were confronted with still another contest—the "Miss Reading Fair" beauty contest—in which entries close Saturday, Aug. 22.

The beauty contest, one of the richest in the nation, offers a veritable treasure trove of prizes. The contest carries a first prize of \$1000 cash, and nine other cash prizes amounting to \$1,300. It also offers more than \$2,000 worth of merchandise gift awards.

Under the beauty contest rules, either single or married women are eligible to compete. Competition is open to women in six Eastern Pennsylvania counties — Berks, Schuylkill, Lebanon, Lancaster, Chester and Montgomery. There is no charge to enter.
