13-FOOT SUNFLOWER GROWING IN FLORIN

Mr. and Mrs. Roy S. Leaman, Wood Street, Florin, have a 13-foot sunflower growing in their vegetable garden.

The plant is apparently the result of the three Leaman children—Dallas, 15; Cynthia Ann, 14, and Jay Gilbert, 10, planting some sunflower seed in a lot some distance away to provide seeds for the cardinals last winter. One of the seeds must have dropped in the carrot patch of the garden.

The flower head is 14 inches in diameter and the stalk of the large plant is four inches across at the bottom.

Obtain Application For Registration Certificate

Any person engaged in the sale of tangible items, and who has not yet received an application for his Certificate of Registration, should obtain one from the office of the Inheritance Tax Collector in 61 out of the state's 67 counties, the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue announced today.

In three of the other 6 counties—Allegheny, Luzerne, Warren—the necessary forms may be gotten at the branch office of the State Revenue Department in the county seats.

In Dauphin County, sellers should contact the Sales and Use Tax Division of the Revenue Department in the Pine Building.

In Indiana County, sellers should contact the Chamber of Commerce, Indiana, Penna.

In Philadelphia, sellers will be notified within a few days as to where applications may be obtained.

Florin Men Experience Thrill Of Landing Marlin

Fishing aboard the 'Mohawk', two Florin men, Al and Wayne Kleiner experienced the "supreme achievement" of an angler when as part of a crew of 7 they hooked, fought and landed a seven-foot, six-inch white marlin, the fightingest of all game fish.

Leaving the dock at 5 a. m. under the sailing of Captain Richard Baird, assisted by First Mate Marvin Crouse, the group trolled for and caught 109 Bonita and 25 Blues. Being satisfied with this catch at 2 p. m. of the smaller game fish they rigged the heavy tackle using a whole squid sewed on the hook and wire leader and set their outriggers to troll for marlin. Their hope was great but their expectations were small that one would be attracted by their lures.

It wasn't long before Captain Baird atop the lookout sighted the tell-tale fins slicing through the water toward the bait. Suddenly and swiftly the fish struck first at one line then another which he swallowed and the hook was set fast, deep inside him. The fight was on requiring the efforts of all members of the crew, directed and assisted by Capt. Baird with Crouse, by Capt. Baird with Crouse, his Mate at the helm. The maneuvering of the boat is extremely important when fighting a big fish as he may make a dash under it, foul up the line and break away.

After a half-hours battle he was brought alongside and heaved into the boat by the tired but happy crew. Even Capt. Baird was so thrilled that he called the Wilmington Marine telephone operator and had his wife at Rehoboth, Del. connected to report their success. These two-way radio telephones surely are a wonderful aid to an anglers safety and convenience.

Bears Says 'We Are In Life And Death Struggle'

The conviction that "we are in a life and death struggle with Communism" and that "if there had not been a Korea our front line today would be the West Coast" was expressed by Chaplain Paul Bears as he addressed the Mount Joy Rotary club.

A veteran of World Wars I and II and recently returned from six and one-half months on the front lines in Korea, Lt. Col. Bears now is chaplain at the veterans hospital at Coatesville.

Col. Bears described Korea as a country with an area equal to that of New York and Pennsylvania together, the terrain largely of rugged mountains, with extremes in weather, and now devastated by mechanized warfare. Only 23 per cent of the land is cultivated with the result that Korea has never been able to feed itself.

Rich Tungsten mines below the 38th parallel have been considered by many as a motivating factor behind the Communists' move to take over South Korea, Bears said.

The speaker characterized the Korean people as being highly intelligent, graceful, extremely loyal, and friendly. The Koreans have the oldest spoken language, which mission workers even after years of working in the country cannot fully master.

Christianity is having its greatest sweep since the first Christian century, right in Korea, Bears declared. He credited Communism's hatred for Christianity as partly responsible for the Korean acceptance of the faith, explaining that the Koreans know what Communism is and realizing Communism's hatred for Christianity want to know more about Christianity.

"I have never seen such a virile faith as is being displayed in Korea," Chaplain Bears stated.

In concluding, the Chaplain declared: "I am convinced that we are in a life and death struggle with Communism and that if there had not been a Korea the Philippines would have fallen to the communists and by this time our front line of defense would be the West Coast."

Mt. Joy Twp. Grades 7-12 May Attend Either Here or Maytown

Pupils who will attend the Mount Joy Borough schools for the first time will be registered on Monday, Aug. 31, at 1 P. M. Grades 1 to 8 will report to the Elementary Building; Grades 9 to 12 will report to the Study Hall in the High School Building.

Pupils who registered for first grade in May, also kindergarten pupils registered Aug. 12 need not register again. This registration is for pupils whose names are not on the school records for September, 1953. Pupils should bring last year's report cards, and birth certificates to this registration.

Teachers will report for a faculty meeting on Monday, Aug. 31 at 10 A. M. Pupils will report at 8:30 A. M. Tuesday, Sept. 1. Grades 1 to 8 will report to the Elementary Building and Grades 9 to 12 will report to the auditorium of the High School. School will close at 11:50 A. M., this day, and regular sessions will begin for Grades 1 - 12 on Wednesday, Sept. 2.

Provision has been made for all pupils, Grades 7 - 12, residing in the part of Mount Joy Twp. in the Donegal Jointure, to attend either Mt. Joy High School or E. Donegal Township High School. The Donegal Joint School Board is now operating High School for all pupils of Grades 7 - 12 in the jointure. The Board is operating High Schools at Maytown, Marietta, and Mount Joy for the year 1953-54.

Mount Joy Chamber of Commerce held its semi-annual dinner meeting Monday evening at Hosteretter's pavilion.

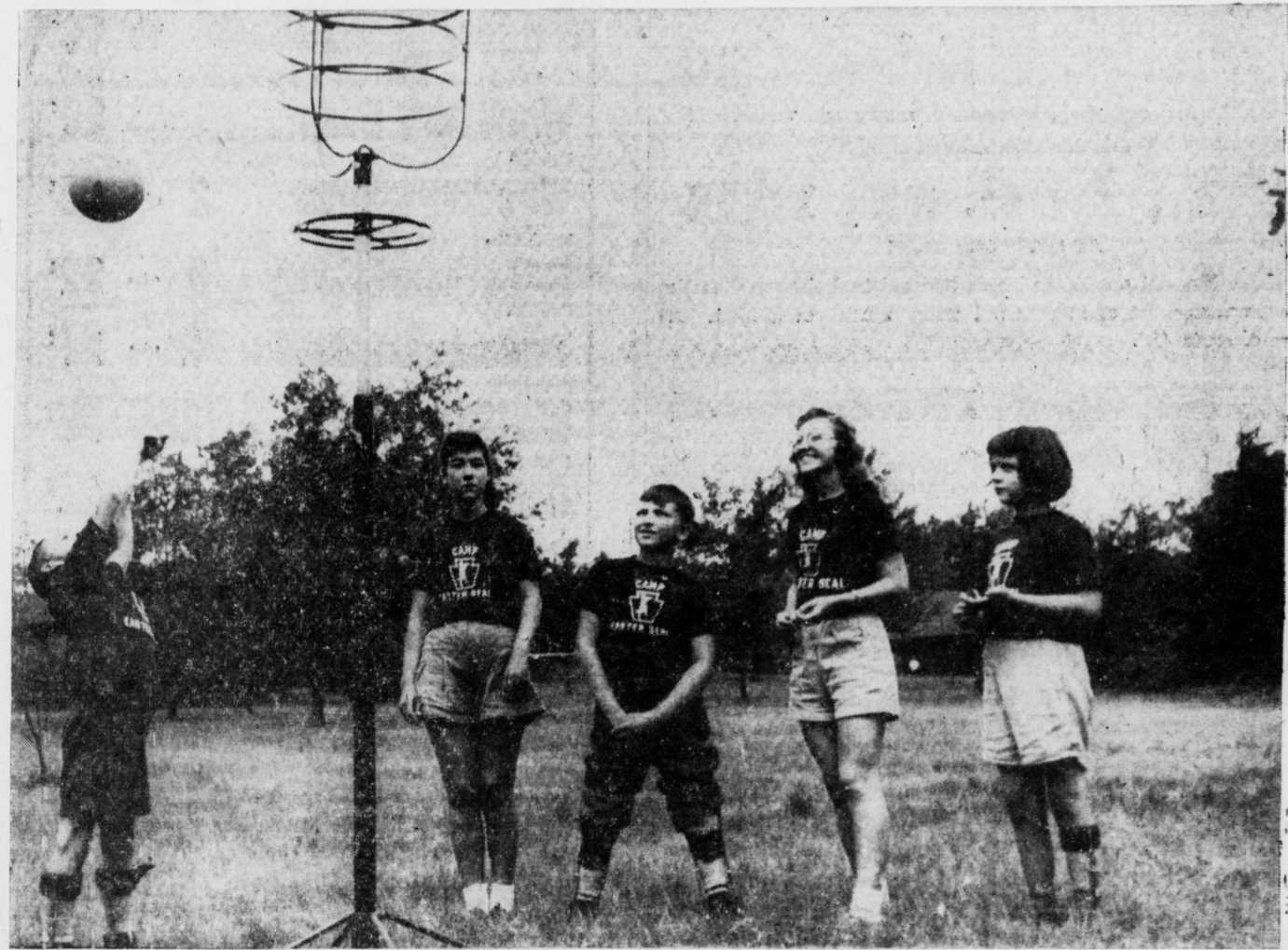
Joseph Michels, water authority engineer, explained the various systems used for sewage disposal and the problems that must be considered in planning a system.
