**WINS IN BUILDING SUIT**

A two-year-old dispute between Paul A. Martin, Mount Joy builder, and the Red Lion school district was settled last week at a meeting of the Red Lion school district board.  
The dispute arose from the construction of Red Lion's \$291,613 auditorium-gymnasium in 1951. Withdrawal of an appeal to the State Supreme Court on a \$15,100 arbitration award made to Martin by the county court was voted, by the board, with the full amount of the award going to the Mount Joy contractor.

Horace E. Smith, school board solicitor, advised the Red Lion directors that their case did not have sufficient merit for an appeal to the higher court.

Martin's attorneys agreed to withdraw \$1,130 in interest charges, also awarded him in the judgment, and a \$1,900 bill for concrete work.

The controversy flared when the board attempted to penalize the contractor \$100 per day for a 151-day delay in completion of the auditorium-gymnasium. An arbitration board, however, supported Martin's claim that the delay was unavoidable and not of his making.

**Charles F. Coghlan Will Complete Ninth Year At Gretna**

Charles F. Coghlan, co-producer and director of the Gretna Playhouse, will have completed nine years at Mt. Gretna at the end of this season.

Mr. Coghlan comes from a family of English actors who came to this country and helped in the establishment and development of the New York Theatre. Rose and Charles Coghlan, his uncle, played at the Wallocks Theatre, 12th and Broadway, when Ada Rehan and John Drew were the featured players at the Dalys Theatre. Slowly the theatre section moved uptown to 26th then to 39th Street at the Empire Theatre. It was here at Empire Theatre, where his family had appeared before him, that our Charles Coghlan appeared in 1918-19 with Ethel Barrymore in "The Lady of the Camillas". This is the same theatre about which there was so much discussion this past year when it was to be torn down.

Mr. Coghlan is well known in New York for his direction of numerous Broadway hits, road productions and stock throughout the country. He is remembered in this section as Director of the Harrisburg Community Theatre, 1943-45.

Currently, at Mt. Gretna, Mr. Coghlan is directing "Lo and Behold", which opens on Thursday, Aug. 20. A Nobel Prize Winner, Wyley Hancock, after eating a hearty meal, prepared by his substitute cook, Katherine Greggs, dies happily. He expects to find peace and solitude as he comes back to inhabit his home, which according to his will is to be perpetuated as a sanctuary for his spirit. Instead he is beset by the spirits of an Indian girl, Kay MacDonald, a Southern belle, Pauline Drake, and a frustrated composer, Jas. Ray. Complications follow.

**Hershey Fetes Pennsylvania Dutch Aug. 27-29**

Harrisburg — Pennsylvania Dutch Days, which always attract thousands of persons to Hershey not only from the Keystone State but from adjoining states, will be observed August 27, 28, and 29, says the Department of Commerce.

This year there will be several new features, including a Dairy Cattle Show for which \$3,800 in prizes will be awarded the winners; schnitzing parties and a Pennsylvania Dutch tall story contest.

In addition to these new features visitors will have an opportunity to inspect folklore exhibits, enjoy square dancing, attend a Pennsylvania Dutch auction, see Penna. Dutch vaudeville and witness the crowning of the State Lotwaerrick (apple butter) Queen. There will also be a Penna. Dutch religious service and Schpiel Ziet (or play time), which will give the visitors an opportunity of seeing Penna. Dutchmen at play. There will also be "cekeballe," or corner ball, which is played in a specially constructed barnyard.
