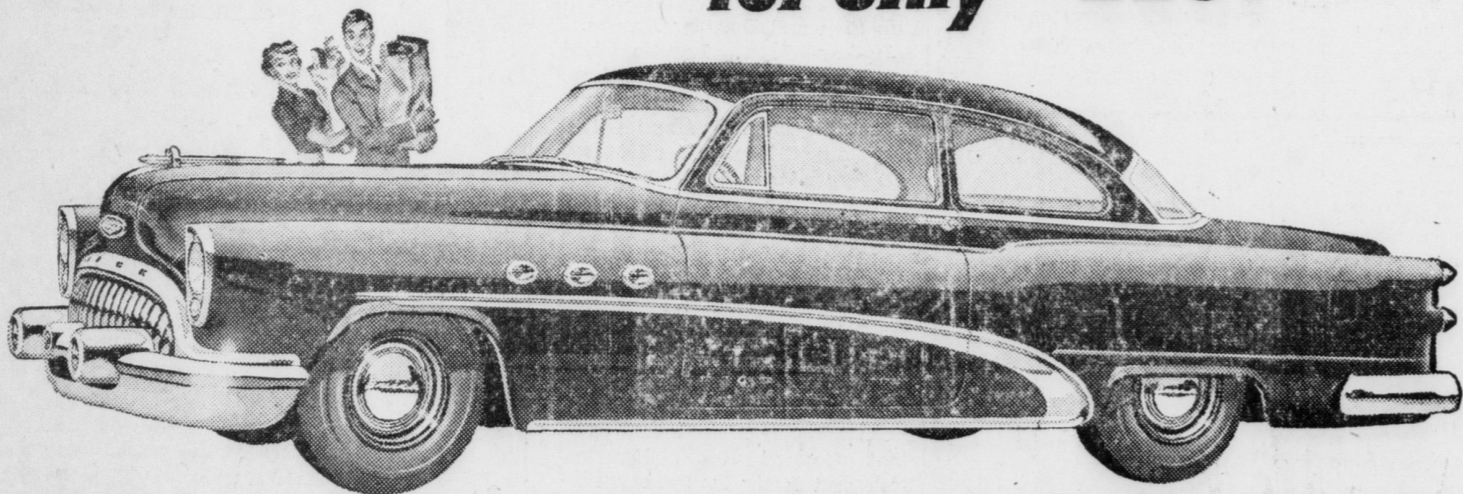

**P. P. & L. Is  
Awarded Top  
Safety Honors**

Pennsylvania Power & Light  
Company took top honors in the  
annual safety contest of the  
Pennsylvania Electric Associa-  
tion. Presentations were made  
at yesterday's session of the as-  
sociation's annual meeting be-  
ing held at the Benjamin Frank-  
lin hotel in Philadelphia.

J. M. Huebner, PP&L vice-  
president and Pennsylvania El-  
ectric Association president,  
presented the award to the lo-  
cal utility and to eight other  
Pennsylvania electric compan-  
ies in recognition of outstand-  
ing safety records.

Pennsylvania Power & Light  
Company took top honors in  
Group 1 with an accident fre-  
quency rate of only 2.94. Group  
1 contestants included all com-  
panies averaging 2,500,000 or  
more manhours worked yearly.  
Plaques were presented to  
first place winners in each  
group by Association President,  
James M. Huebner, vice presi-  
dent of PP&L Company, Allen-  
town. Second and third place  
winners received certifi-  
cates of merit.

This was the twenty-fourth  
consecutive safety contest spon-  
sored by the Pennsylvania as-  
sociation. It ran from June, 1952,  
to July, 1953, inclusive, and was  
conducted by the accident pre-  
vention committee, under the  
chairmanship of L. F. Hefmen-  
way of Pennsylvania Power  
Company, New Castle.
