Weekly Letter Penna. Game Commission

Crisp air and colorful foliage are causing hunters to train their sights on the fall game seasons and check guns and gear in anticipation of "the opener." All of a sudden, too, many sportsmen who have not been able to go afield to "count their chickens" are beginning to ask about game bird prospects for this fall.

The Game Commission reports indications are there will be as good waterfowl hunting in the Keystone State as in '52. The woodcock, throughout its range, apparently continue at a high production level. With these birds, as with ducks, should weather conditions be favorable hunting will be good. Ringneck pheasants are appearing in larger numbers than last year. According to field observations wild turkeys are more abundant than in 1952. Except in some northcentral counties, where maturing timber and overbrowsing by deer have affected them adversely, ruffed grouse were reported in mid-summer at least as numerous as last July and August. Wildlife authorities are maintaining a close watch on the thunder birds, however, anticipating the periodic crash in grouse may occur yet this fall. Bobwhite quail, though not legal game this year, are making an encouraging so-called comeback in quite a number of counties.

The Game Commission lists game bird releases of the spring of 1953 as follows:

Pheasants, 60,196. Roughly, the ratio was 1 male to 2 females. Of this total, 39,919 ringnecks were produced at Pennsylvania State game farms 20,277 were purchased from Pennsylvania breeders, which birds were retained over last winter in holding pens.

Wild turkeys, 2394, of which 497 were males, 1897 were hens—roughly 1 to 4.

Bobwhite quail, 4405, or about 2200 pairs.

Liberated in spring, the birds enumerated above increased the number of game birds al-

ready in the coverts and helped produce the shootable supply (except quail) for this fall.

Since spring, some ringnecks have been released. More will be turned out just before the small game season, and still more during the season. All told, the number of pheasants liberated this summer and fall will number nearly 52,000, on a ratio of 2 cocks for each hen.

Wild turkey releases which began in August and will be completed before the 1953 small game season, will put 3,700 of these coveted birds, all of them young gobblers, in turkey range.

Between spring and mid-September 5500 more quail (paired up) were turned loose, welcome additions to farm areas of the Quaker State.

All in all it appears that in 1953, Nature, with the good assistance of farmers, sportsmen and the Game Commission, produced another fine crop of game birds for Pennsylvania's army of hunters.

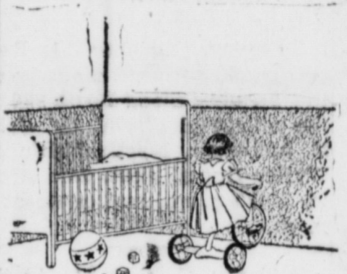


Handy Jim's FIX-UP TIPS For Farm and Home

Leatherwood Wainscot

THE wainscot of a child's room is subjected to hard wear and tear. If it's papered, this lower wall area soon has a sorry appearance and must be replaced.


By surfacing this space with a tough, durable panel, the youngster and his playmates may play at ease, and there



is no problem of a marred wall. Often used for a wainscot in nurseries and recreation rooms is Masonite Leatherwood, which is selected for its long life and nice appearance.

This hardboard panel has an embossed surface that looks like Spanish grain leather. It is extremely tough and highly resistant to abrasion and moisture. It may be beautifully painted in a solid color or in two tones.

Leatherwood, which may be obtained from lumber dealers, comes in widths of four feet. As it is only one-eighth inch thick, it may be applied directly over the existing wall.
