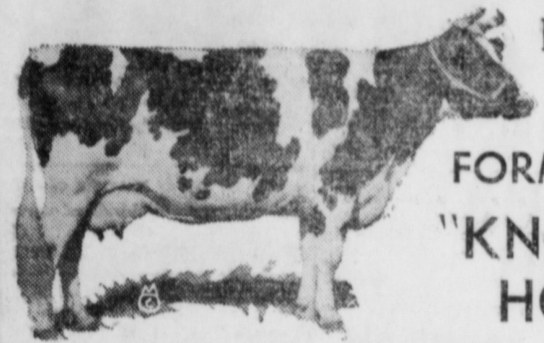

Mount Joy Boy Selected For Polio Poster

A Mount Joy boy, Cory L. Funk, four-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Z. Funk, 325 E. Main street, has been selected as Pennsylvania's poster boy for the 1954 March of Dimes and Dollars campaign.

He was the runner-up in the recent selection of the 1954 national poster boy, and was picked for Pennsylvania by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. He was nominated by Christian C. Rudy, the Lancaster Chapter chairman.

His picture will appear on the local posters as well as posters throughout the state. He was stricken ill with the dreaded disease on Sept. 29, 1951, and was admitted to the Polio unit of the Lancaster General Hospital where he remained until Oct. 24 of that year. Today with the aid of braces financed by the chapter Cory is showing steady improvement in use of both of his legs.

Rudy gave credit for much of Cory's recovery in the use of his legs to the diligent physical therapy provided at the Lancaster General Hospital. The chapter paid the bill for the hospital, doctor, and nursing care, and all the braces received by the boy up to this time.

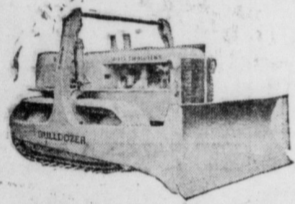

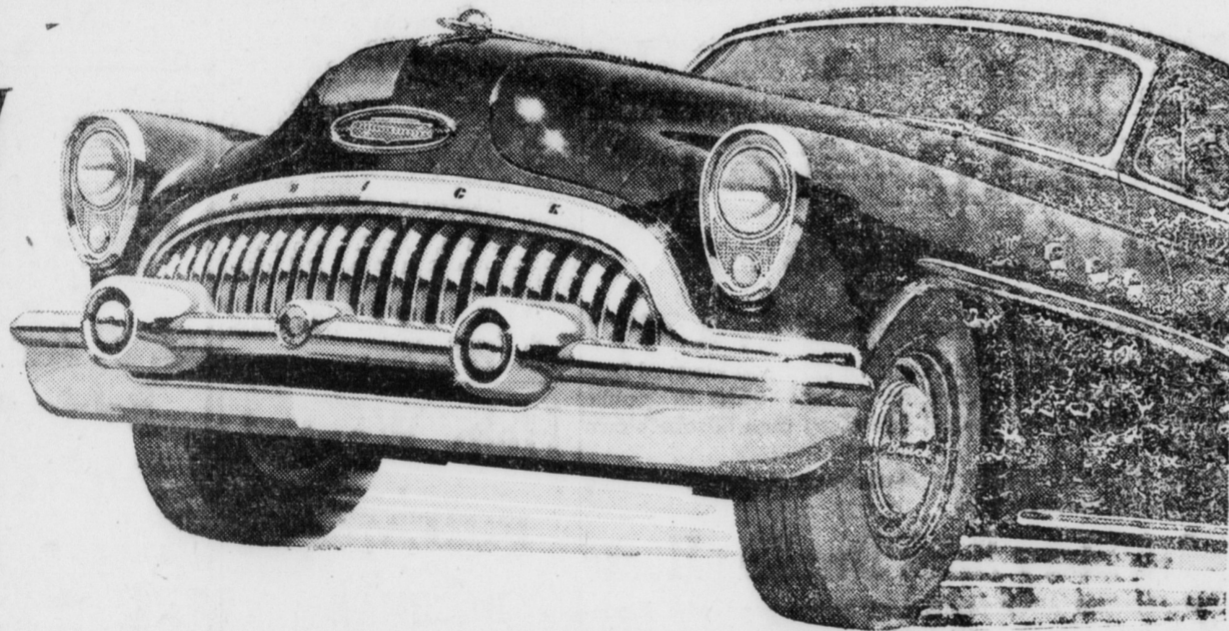
