Farm Calendar

CATTLE FEEDERS TO MEET—A steer feeders' field day will be held in the Lancaster Stock Yards, Friday, Oct. 9. Thomas King, Penn State extension livestock specialists, announces a demonstration of the grades of cattle bought and sold daily. Livestock marketing authorities will speak in the afternoon program.

CHECK EGG EQUIPMENT—In the interest of accuracy, egg scales and egg graders should be checked occasionally, reminds Kermit Bidth, Penn State extension marketing specialist. Individual eggs must meet minimum weight requirements or the whole case will be put in a lower grade even though the net weight of the case is correct.

KEEP PIGS GROWING—The hog business is not profitable unless pigs keep growing from the time they are farrowed until they are ready for market, says Dwight Younkin, Penn State extension livestock specialist. The heavier the pig is at birth and at weaning time the earlier they will reach market weight.

SAVE LEAVES—If you burn leaves or other plant foliage that is not diseased, you are destroying a good source of organic matter of humus or your soil. Penn State extension garden specialists suggests making a compost pile or digging the foliage into the soil.

COLLECT SOIL—Soil for use in hotbeds and coldframes next spring should be collected now, says James Dutt, Penn State extension vegetable specialist. Then it can be sterilized for control of diseases and insects which might cause trouble for next year's plants.

CLEAN EQUIPMENT—Clean all shelters, brooders, and

range next spring when the ground may be soft, urges Carl Dossin, Penn State extension poultry specialist.
